versity Hospital Needed.

SOCIETIES CONTRIBUTE

Interest in the Fund Has Been
Widespread All Around
City.

Contributions for the Western Uni-
versity hospital fund have continued
to come in since the departure of the
unit from London last Friday, and the
\$5,000 mark has now been nearly reach-
ed. As a few hundred dollars of this
have been designated for special ob-
jects, however, there is still opportu-
nity for others wishing to contribute.

The interest in this matter has been
very widespread. The subscriptions
have come not only from the city, rep-
resenting officials, faculty and gradu-
ates of the university, businessmen
and friends of the unit generally, but
also from many individuals and organi-
zations belonging to other places, in-
cluding St. Thomas, St. Mary's, Inger-
soll, Stratford, Kingston, St. Catharines,
Sombra, Ballymore, Newbury, Amherst-
burg, Thamesville and Listowel.

The hearty thanks of the committee
are due to all who responded so prompt-
ly, especially in the view of the short
time given to the unit, and without mak-
ing necessary a personal canvass.

Over 100 cots in the hospital have
been named after persons and societies
contributing amounts of \$25 and over. As
to the unit after it is finally located, any

dent Brathwaite at any time.

sociation. The returned soldiers
will resign in a body from the latter as-
sociation, unless Mr. Lance is removed.
That he will be is certain, and harmony
will prevail, it is claimed.

It is expected that a returned soldier
will be made permanent secretary of
the Soldiers' Association.

INDIAN ABSENTEES FROM LAMBTON UNIT DEFY MILITARY RULE

Claim They Have London Legal Opinion That as Wards of
Government They Don't Have To Fight —
Dislike Camp Borden.

SARNIA, Aug. 23.—Major William
MacVicar of the 140th Battalion ar-
rived in the city last night from Camp
Borden, the object of his visit being
to investigate the cases of over 100
absentees from the battalion, away
without leave, or absent beyond the
time allowed.

Among the absentees are about fifty
Indians, formerly from the reserva-
tion to the south of here, or from
Walpole Island.

"There is no question as to our
power with the others, but the Indians
are giving us no little concern, as they
have sought legal advice in London
and have been told that, being wards
of the Government, they don't have to
fight," declared the major this
morning.

"This has produced a delicate situa-
tion as these fifty who were allowed
home on harvest furlough now are
deciding whether or not they will
return."

I have secured the opinion of Judge
Advocate General Smith at Ottawa,
and he maintains that once the Indi-
ans are enlisted, they are bound by the
same law as others, and can be brought
back to his battalion if away without
leave of absence or beyond the time
allowed.

The question in dispute involves a
delicate technicality in law and before
any action is taken the question will
be submitted to the highest courts, or,
if necessary, carried to the privy coun-
cil of England.

In the meantime Major MacVicar
will attempt to do nothing with those
Indian members of the battalion who
decline to return until the question of
power held by the military authorities
in this respect is settled.

Object to Camp Borden.

One of the Indian members of the
battalion, spoken to today concerning
the situation, said they objected to
Camp Borden, but were satisfied while
in London.

"Too much dust, sand, flies and
other things up there," said the brave.
"What about the rumor to the effect
that Lieut. Col. Bradley was to be re-
duced from command and that you were
in charge?" was asked the major.

"You may state through the press
and as emphatically as you like that
Lieut. Col. Bradley is still in command
of the 140th," said Major MacVicar.

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MANY CHANGES AND PROMOTIONS MADE IN THE 142ND BATTALION

Captains Sawyer, Ingram and

OFFICERS COMING TODAY

Draft of Fourteen Are Going
Overseas Shortly for
Further Training.

CAMP BORDEN, August 23.—Four-
teen officers from battalions from No. 1
division left Borden tonight to report
in London on Friday morning to go
overseas with a second draft of officers.
They are: Lieuts. F. H. Hall, T. R.
Grievess, Jack Harvey and McCann,
124th; Lieuts. R. T. Ferguson, Ernest
Porter, 161st; Lieuts. W. R. Adams, M.
R. Sloan and G. C. Langford, 188th;
and Lieuts. Vernon Lick, Leslie Dick-
son, Harold Mitchell and Houghton,
161st.

Through the selection of the officers
of the 161st the battalion loses its bay-
onet fighting, bombing and musketry
officers. The commanding officer does
not care to lose these men, but the
near future is so remote that the men
are taking advantage of selection
made by Colonel Shannon.

To Attend Course.

Major W. G. Jackson, Capt. W. L.
Heath, 124th; Majors W. D. Mercer and
R. Pollock, 147th, and Lieuts.
Knowles and Fouse, 14th, are directed
to attend the fifth musketry course,
which opens at the Rockcliffe ranges,
Ottawa, on August 28.

Ptes. Richard Taylor and W. Grishy
are struck from the 142nd as medically
unfit.

Lieuts. Milton Steward and Arthur
Williamson have been promoted to be
captains. Lieuts. W. T. Ferguson and
J. V. MacKenzie receive their super-
numery appointments today. Major
W. M. McIntosh, who was a major in
the militia, is given authority to com-
mand the 142nd, become majors.

C. F. Doughty and C. J. Unlace are
permitted to resign their appointments.
Capt. F. S. Fisher, L. H. Ingram, H.
R. Sawyer, 142nd, become majors.
Lieut. W. Crocker, a captain; Lieut.
T. Taylor, 7th Regiment, a lieutenant
in the battalion; Lieut. A. G. Asby is
permitted to resign his appointment in
the 142nd; Capt. D. R. Doyle, W. D.
Mercer, R. Pollock, become majors in
the 147th and Lieut. Hugh Hedge,
C.O.T.C.A., supernumery in the 147th.

Are Doing Work.

These officers have been performing
the duties attached to the ranks to
which they have been appointed, and
today have been officially notified of
their promotions.

In future the trains carrying men
who have missed trains in Toronto
and elsewhere will not be allowed to
enter camp. The men will be treated
as absentees.

Lieut. H. E. Gray, Major A. H. Mon-
teith, Capt. F. G. Sanderson and Lieut.-
Col. Delamere, 110th, have been granted
leave commencing tomorrow for
three weeks. Lieut. G. H. Smith, 168th,
seven days' leave; Lieut. E. E. Shaw-
ler, 149th, two days leave, and Major
E. M. Macdon, 142nd, five days com-
mencing tomorrow.

A call is being sent for nurses of
three years' training, over 25 years
and under 45 years of age, and phy-
sically fit to work in the Queen Alex-
andra Nursing Service. Their pay will
be less than the C. A. M. C. as will
their allowances. They will have no
uniforms to purchase until they reach
England, and will proceed overseas at
once at the expense of the imperial
service.

Miss Jean Gunn, Toronto General
Hospital, will select 67 nurses from the
applicants in this division. Two
hundred are expected from Canada.

two months.

Vancouver, has passed his examinations
for a lieutenancy, and because of delay
in securing an appointment, hopes to re-
join his regiment within a short time.

GERMAN OUTRAGES WILL BE DISCUSSED BY FRENCH HOUSE

Measures Will Be Taken At
Proper Time Against
the Kaiser.

Paris, Aug. 4.—What measures can
be taken at the proper time against the
emperor of Germany and other persons
held to be answerable for compelling
inhabitants of the invaded cities of
Northern France to work in the fields,
and the immediate steps which France
might take in behalf of these people,
are questions to be raised in the ap-
proaching session of the Chamber of
Deputies.

Deputy Boussoin, in a letter to Pre-
mier Briand, in which he severely criti-
cized the acts of the Germans towards
the population of the invaded region,
gave notice that he would interpellate
the premier on these subjects.

ROMANONES STUDIES PROTEST.

Madrid, Aug. 4.—The recent note of
the French Government to neutrals,
protesting against the treatment of
French inhabitants of Lille, Roubaix
and Tournai by the Germans will be
and Tuesday by the Germans will be
the subject of serious study by Premier
Romanones, so as to permit him to act
according to strict neutrality, the pre-
mier states. The Spanish Government
will also will consult other neutral nations
regarding their attitude before giving
France an answer, he added.

The premier has already taken steps
to learn the opinion of the American
Government, as well as that of other
neutral nations, on the matter.

DUKE OF CONNAUGHT VISITS GERMAN PRISONERS

Governor-General Inspects Internment
Quarters at Halifax.

Halifax, N. S., Aug. 23.—An interest-
ing episode in the visit of the govern-
ing prince to the internment quarters
at Halifax occurred today when
his royal highness visited the internment
quarters there are about three hundred
German prisoners, all officers, the rank
and file being in the detention camp in
much greater numbers than at Amherst.

The duke was escorted into the in-
closure where the prisoners are kept at
the citadel, and was introduced to the
officer who is looked upon as their leader. His
royal highness conversed for some time
with this German and passed up and
down the lines where the other pris-
oners could see him and hear him. They
gave him a warm welcome, and the

of Connaught will, tomorrow, continue
his inspection of the forts, and will also
visit the Halifax ocean terminals, now
in course of construction. On Friday he
will attend a garden party.
