CO-ORDINATION IS PURPOSE OF MEETING OF EMPIRE PREMIERS

Daily Telegraph Comments On Importance of Forthcoming Gathering.

LONDON, June 10.—(Canadian Associated Press).—The Daily Telegraph says today that the conference of empire premiers which takes place here this month is not a meeting of the imperial cabinet, though it was so designated in the first announcements. It appears, the newspaper remarks, to have been the original intention to act on the remarkable precedent established during the war, when members of the dominion governments were requested to attend meetings of the British cabinet to deal with problems arising out of the war. It may have been thought in some quarters that this expedient should solve the problem of imperial organization, and that it would be stereotyped in a constitutional system, but our modern use of the term constitutional system connotes definite responsibility to a definite constituency and the expedient on an imperial executive evolved for war purposes does not provide for an apportionment of precise responsibility, the paper thinks.

The present conference will endeavor, the newspaper adds, to sketch out a plan of executive co-ordination for consideration of the constitutional convention which it is proposed to hold next year. This conference, the Telegraph hopes, will afford another example of the ability of British statesmen to surmount in practice the peculiar difficulties of operating our complicated imperial system, and again offer striking testimony to the political instinct, moderation and good will animating the whole mass.

"ANGLICANS AND PROTESTANTS" CAUSE OF WARM DEBATE

High and Low Churchmen Differ As To Correctness of Expression.

TORONTO, June 10.—Whether the Anglican Church should classify itself as other than a Protestant Church was a question that caused warm discussion between High churchmen and Low churchmen at the opening of the synod today. The discussion arose out of a remark in Archbishop Inglis' report on his city missionary work that "on Saturday afternoon his class included Anglicans and Protestants." The Canon Cody protested against such discrimination in terms. "I am sure the archbishop would Saturday."

WATFORD VILLAGE TO HAVE PERMANENT HIGHWAY

Lambton County Council Grants Reductions Assessment to Sombra.

SARNIA, June 10.—A permanent main highway through the village of Watford now seems assured. After hearing the spokesmen of a deputation from the municipality, and after considerable discussion, the Lambton County Council this afternoon adopted a motion, authorizing the warden and clerk to sign the agreement upon advice of the solicitor, which will enable the village to obtain Government aid. The grant made for this work will be forwarded to the county and then turned over to the Watford Council, no expense being entailed to the county. "There are many things I would like to discuss with the council, having passed through a season that will long be remembered as far as road conditions are concerned," said County Road Superintendent John McCallum. "But I will only touch briefly on a few that occur to me now. At the outset I might say that labor conditions now are better. There is no trouble in getting all the labor we want and at fair wages, and we are doing an immense amount of work."

Reeve Harkness moved that the assessment in Sarnia Township be left as it was last year, except in the case of Sombra, where the acreage has been overstated. A standing vote was taken, and the issue was adopted by a good majority, the committee report being turned down. In addition to the proposed increase for Sarnia Township the report recommended that the acreage of Sombra Township be reduced from 72,325 to 71,151 acres, and that it be levied at \$10 an acre, and that Point Edward be equalized at \$225,000 in place of \$149,647.

CLEANING UP WORK FOLLOWING ASSEMBLY

Toronto, June 10.—St. James Square Presbyterian Church was deserted today save for a staff of workers engaged

in the work of cleaning up after the ten days' session of the Presbyterian General Assembly. The exodus of out-of-town delegates, which commenced on Wednesday, was practically completed today save for a few who remained to spend the week-end in To-

ronto before returning to their homes. No date has been set for a meeting of the committee appointed by the assembly to proceed with union negotiations, and it is unknown as yet just what procedure the committee will follow.

WOMAN COMMITS SUICIDE. Calgary, June 10.—Clad in a night-dress, a woman started to be Mrs. W. Butts of Flapout, near Maple Creek, walked up to the Canadian Pacific main line yesterday and, placing her head on the track, was decapitated by an oncoming freight train.

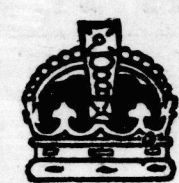

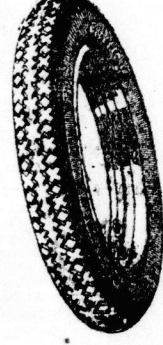
