Street Railway Sets Price On Road That Will Enable City To Operate At Profit From Outset

President Currie Explains Basis of Offer Made To Mayor Wenige—Price Is Something Like 75 Cents On the Dollar of the Assets.

The price at which the London Street Railway has just offered its line to the city would permit opera-tion at a profit from the outset, according to Charles Currie, president of the company. President Currie as had a number of conferences with Mayor Wenige, who was authorized by the council to secure a price from the company. A price was named, and the mayor will now present it to the council. In an interview following the negotiations, Mr. Currie outlined the procedure which he believes will now be taken to acquire the street railway property, and stated why he regarded the offer of the company as not only fair, but

decidedly low.
To Go To People. "We have submitted a price to Mayor Wenige," said Mr. Currie, "which we think the city would be unwise not to accept. If the council sees fit the people will vote on the ourchase at the municipal election in

"Why do you think the offer you have made to the city is fair?" Mr. Currie was asked. "Because it is less than the actual cost of the road without any capitalization of earning power," replied Mr. Currie. "It is less than the actual cost less depreciation, which leaves it something like 75 cents on the dollar of the assets. I am not here to exact one cent from the people of London beyond what would be a decidedly

fair price for this property, and I think that would be fair. tion plan.'
