RESEARCH BUREAU

Capt. Brodsky May Undertake Project for Chambers of Commerce.

REQUIRES \$100,000

Scheme Would Be Great Benefit to Industry of Western Ontario.

Establishment in London, as the center of Western Ontario, of a search bureau, is a project which the science in industry committee of the London chamber of commerce has

under way at the present time. A meeting was held on Tuesday afternoon at which the members con-ferred with Capt. G. Brodsky, fornerly a member of the faculty of the inversity of Western Ontario, who is understood, signified his willingness to undertake the establish-ment of such a bureau, if assured of local support. The proposition was thoroughly gone into, and another meeting will be held on Monday

evening to further develop the pro-Meanwhile D. H. McDermid, chairman of the committee, will confer to manufacturers of this whole district. Anauguration of the bureau would call for an initial outlay of about \$100.000, admittedly a large sum to raise locally. For this reason the whole scheme is likely to be referred to the annual meeting of the
