The premier meets miners' representatives today to discuss the proposition he laid before the owners yesterday Later he attends the joint miners-owners conference. This presided over by W. C Bridgeman, who has acted as inter nediary in the prolonged efforts to bring the two sides together for the drawing up of a new working agree-

ment.
The report to the government committee of inquiry into the mining situation does not, as has been rumored, suggest a subsidy for the mines. It upholds the miners in their demands for a minimum wage agree ment, but the committee believes that the wage should be determined

by negotiations.


