The Murderers of Chief Hennessy, at New Orleans, Taken From the Jail and Hanged.

At the meeting of the stock exchange members held this afternoon, the election of Foreman Seligman, of the jury, who is a member of the exchange, was discussed. As a result resolutions expelling him were unanimously adopted.

Antonio Bagnetto was left hanging about an hour and a half, and then taken down by the police. The coroner found that death had been caused by strangulation. Manuel Politizi was also cut down by the police. He had been hanged to a lamp post and his body riddled with bullets. The verdict in his case was death from gun-shot wound in the head and chest. There were also marks of strangulation around the neck.

AN APPEAL FOR VENGRANGE.

New York, March 14.—L'Eco D'Italia, one of the representative Italian newspapers in this city, issued an extra edition, to-day, at 11 o'clock. The story of the wholesals killing was told briefly, and was followed by the following editorial and appeal: "Without words, we want satisfaction in full and complete. If the minister at Washington has not at this hour made his word good, 1,000,000 of Italians residing in the United States will know how to do it. If the massacre that we have witnessed in this free republic is allowed to go unpunished, we will denounce it as assassination. Our word is quickly pledged. We never repent. Vendetta." The newspaper invites to a mass meeting, whoever has a lieur that beats in his bosom. "In this moment of persecution," it adds, "through maligaity and wrath and hate, we ought to remember that we are all Italians, and as such we invite El Progresso and El Campo to unite with us at the grand mass meeting. Colleagues, be quick to join hands. We are ready and always with you; in this supreme hour of our vindication, let us be united in the name of God; death to those who allowed such a butchery." Although L Eco D'Italia announces a meeting for Tuesday night, this announcement was made this morning, and the excitement grew so intense during the day that it was decided to hold the meeting as soon as possible, and it

will be held to-morrow night. Late toa number of prominent Italians forwarded telegrams to the Italian ambassador at Washington calling his attention to the murder at New Orleans, and demanding that he take proper steps in the matter and give it the recognition its importance deserves.

FOREMAN OF THE JURY ARRESTED.

The Bodies of Eleven Prisoners Riddled With Bullets by an Excited Mob.

The Jury Were Tampered With, and Had to Flee to Avoid the Populace.

New Orleans, La, March 14.—The Sicilian members of the La Mafia Society, whom a jury failed to convict yesterday of the murder of Chief of Police Hennessy, were this morning killed by a mob in the parish prison. The multitude participating in the avenging work marched to Canal street after the bloody work was over, shouting and waving their handkerchiefs in the air. There is intense excitement in the city. As soon as the shooting was known, an ambulance was telephoned for, but its presence was not necessary, and only the comment's services were required.

PRIEMAN OF THE JURY ARRESTED.

NEW ORLEANS, March 14.—Seligman, the foreman of the jury that tried the alleged murderers of Chief of Police Hennessey, was arrested, this morning, at a small railroad station, while attempting to leave town. The railroad station at which he was captured is just outside the city limits. Marchest died this evening, at 7 o'clock. The coroner's jury presented a finding which merely said that the persons who shot the prisoners was held, to night, by the leaders in to-day's movement. The occurrence of the day was discussed and the action to be taken in the future. It was decided to shed no mere blood, but those who have not yet been tried for murder, as well as those who tampered with the witnesses and the jury, shall be vigorously prosecuted in the courts. THE GERMAN NAVY.

A Berlin dispatch says that the German navy will receive additions during the present year of 37 ironclad gunboats and tor pede boats. The navy on service will then consist of 96 vessels. Great importance is attached to the torpedo boats. Last year the torpedo boat squadron consisted of only twelve torpedo boats. This year the treedo boat squadron will, if the program is earried out, contain one dispatch to two torpedo division boats and 24 torpe boats. The torpedo squadron is on act service from April 1 to October 1.

FAVORITEISM IN THE GREMAN ARMY.

There are loud mutterings among army officers over the promotion by the Kaiser of his princely connections to army posts over the heads of other efficers. The most prominent appointment of this kind is that of the hereditary Grand Duke of Baden to be Major-General and: Commander of the 4th Brigade of Foot Guards, with his quarters in Berlin. The grand duke was promoted over the heads of no fewer than 62 senior officers. The Heriditary Prince of Meinengen, brother-in-law of the Kaiser, was recently appointed Lieut-Governor over the heads of 32 officers. This is discouraging to the officers generally, many of whom did splendid service in the Franco-Prussian war and who see themselves pushed side to make way for princelings without any military capacity except to enjoy the holiday honors of the service.

Macheo, the arch conspirator, cronched down in a corner, with his hands before his eyes, and screamed. A dozen bullets entered his body, and he pitched head-foremost on the stone pavement, dead.

In the great confusion it was difficult to ascertain who had been killed. While the work of vengeance was going on inside, a growd of men came out of the jail with the carry assassin Politizi. Some one had a rope, and as the miserable Italian was rushed to the corner, the line was thrown over a post and his body was riddled with bullets.

Then on the other side of the prison Bagnetti, one of the assassins, was brought out already in the throes of death from a bullet hole in his head. The rope was thrown over a limb of a tree and he was hoisted in the air.

Policeman Heron, who was in the prison, was shot in the neck, and is the only one outside of the prisoners who suffered.

After the work was done, Mr. Parkerson addressed the crowd and advised them to disperse. They frantically applauled and when he had finished they carried him on their shoulders.
