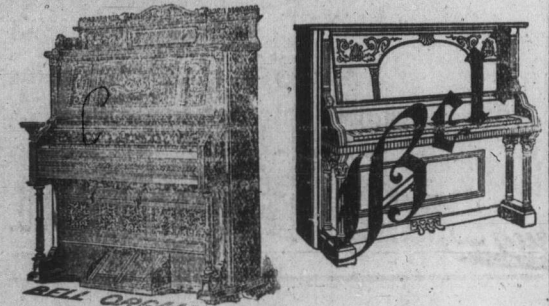

COME FOR MAYOR NOW WATCHWORD

Dalhousie Citizens to Take Town Affairs Out of Grip of Rule

MONTGOMERY EXPOSED

Dear Mr. Editor:— I would crave a space in the columns of your valuable paper to deal with the subject of a Dalhousie side which appeared recently in the columns of one of your contemporaries, and to correct some of the statements made by the correspondent of that paper—statements which, if left uncontradicted, may obtain an amount of credence which their notorious value does not merit. I refer to the matter of the Dalhousie mayoralty contest now approaching, and although I do not know to whose charges I am about to answer, I nevertheless feel as certain that he is a tool of the present Mayor as I do that he has none of the characteristics peculiar to a gentleman.

This attack upon some of our most straightforward and go-ahead citizens is utterly contemptible in its inception, and in its expression boasts as notoriously vulgar, as that cringing—Montgomery—who inspired it. The efforts made by Montgomery's faction to defame his chief are painfully amusing to anyone who knows the whole history of the town's water supply. Perhaps the correspondent of your contemporary will explain for the edification of the ratepayers why the town of Dalhousie paid (roundly) \$75,000, for a water supply, than which a better could have been installed for the expenditure of about one half that sum, and why we paid Mr. Montgomery that \$100,000 for a corner of his swamp in Bathurst. If this is Montgomery's best, it's none too good for us.

Further, I would ask, what did Montgomery ever do for the town which was not absolutely and wholly self-centered? One will answer, Restigouche Wood-working Co; but the obvious reply to that would be that no town worth the name welcomes the advent of industries that are either so badly managed or non-lucrative for other reasons that only the greed of their plant deprives them of the necessity of shutting up shop. Will his Worship the Mayor, deny the above?

The other correspondent lays great stress upon the fact that a large number of prominent citizens waited upon Montgomery, but he doesn't go on to say just how the prominent citizens waited, nor does he mention that it was only by the arduous labor of Montgomery's body-guard, "Maddus," aided by "Tracy Jim," the vicarious auditor of his own expenditures, that a list of some of the signatories was arranged, many of whom have since gone on record that they would not have done so had there been any choice in the way of Mayors at that time. These are the blindest members of the following. The others are, for the most part, his clients in the Shyluck business, and investigation would show that a mortgage or loan is at the bottom of most of their loyalties. Surely this is a wise young Jethro Bass come to reign in our midst. All this might suggest Winston Churchill and Coalition politics in the early seventies, but for the fact that the subject under discussion is so different from the original Jethro. Here is nothing to back up the policies but low cunning, and dirty mud-slinging, the outward signs of a mind diseased. And this is the man who would boss our town and try to cast a slur upon our best and cleanest citizens. The men he tries to blackguard are so far removed above his plane morally and intellectually that they can afford to ignore his disgusting tricks, but in the interests of the welfare of the citizens it would be well to say a few words about the man who is to be the next Mayor, and his associates.

William F. Comeau, Esquire, has been well and favorably known in the town for the last six years previous to which he had a long and honorable career in Campbellsburg business circles, and before that at Ottawa and elsewhere, always carrying with him a species reputation. He is a thorough business man, capable as well to fill the position of first citizen as he most certainly is to hold the reins of an account, the largest and most important in our town, a fact which is vouched for by the illustration of the confidence placed in him by his employers, who back him in the Mayor's contest. But no alone be it understood because he has also the support of all our leading citizens. If Messrs. LeBlond, Smith, Hilyard, Murphy, Watts, MacGregor and others are not among our leading citizens—well, your correspondent would like to know. I would not offer any better proof of the pettiness of Montgomery than a perusal of his photograph, but as the Tribune is a printing business of the man and his methods must be pardoned.

The great Big Sum dominates all his actions.

Mr. Montgomery thinks our forests are becoming denuded (pretty language indeed) and that ought to give him his paper some more to be a security of full intent for the purpose of his fight after election, and we would here squeeze in the suggestion that Mr. Montgomery is not yet the old to seek employment elsewhere like the other innocent youths of his acquaintance. There is a whole lot of room in the woods set for one more skunk. The ratepayers ought to look the facts in the face and when polling day comes around the man who has the town's interests at heart—a genuine, self-centred ghost of the no coin type like this Montgomery election. Of course they may, some of them vote to lose—mortgage can work wonders—but our idea is Comeau for Mayor.

LUMBER COMPANY'S IMPROVEMENTS

Extending Wharf and Other Changes Being Made to Improve Facilities.

CIVIC AFFAIRS.

DALHOUSIE, Feb. 17.—The Dalhousie Lumber Co. are at present making extensive improvements to their private wharf, to enable them to ship, more conveniently, in about a month's time they will have a berth ready to launch a vessel 250 feet in length could carry a load of 3,000 tons, and a large quantity of cargo.

Further extensions to their large wharf will be made next winter. This work is furnishing labor to many men here, who otherwise would be idle, as there is no guaranteed work going on in our harbor, this winter.

The St. John fishermen are busy taking up their nets, and having been received that the Minister of Marine and Fisheries had decided to grant a subsidy to the small fishermen from the reports of the overboard from Quebec and the Maritime Provinces, stating at the same time that it was at the best interests of the fishery and of the majority of those concerned in the industry, that no extension be granted.

The assessors appointed for the year are Raymond E. Allen, Chipman Bateman, Mathias Comeau. The finishing touches have been made to the Dalhousie Club rooms and everything is in readiness for the ball that is to take place on Friday evening, 19th inst. Over two hundred invitations have been issued, including a large number from Campbellton, Bathurst, Jacques River, Charlo and New Richmond, P. Q.
