FUNERAL OF LATE CHAS. R. SCOLES

Special Train Carried Funeral Cortege to New Carlisle—The Funeral Service

The funeral of the late Charles R. Scoles was held on Friday, May 26th, from the residence of the deceased at 11 o'clock a. m. The remains were brought from Bermuda by his wife and daughter and were met in New York by his son-in-law, Senator Casgrain and many other friends. At Quebec the bereaved family were joined by Rev. E. A. Dunn, son of our late Bishop. At the request of his many friends special trains were run so that they could pay their last respects to one whom they looked up to with the greatest respect and admiration.

The funeral procession left the residence at 11 o'clock in the following order:—Guard of Honor, numbering about 100 soldiers, commanded by Lieut. J. Belanger; the hearse; the pall bearers, namely Hon. J. H. Kelly, W. Hamon, Dr. Maguire, W. M. Sheppard, R. Montgomery, R. N. LeBlanc, A. R. Boulton and J. O. Sherar; an extra carriage carrying the flowers; chief mourners, son-in-law and daughter; the clergymen; the railway employees and the public.

A very impressive service was held at the church which was so crowded that a large number of friends were not able to get admission. The officiating clergymen were Rev. W. FRENCH MAKE GAINS AT VERDUN FRONT

Capture German Guns and Prisoners—Progress in South Africa

London, May 31st.—A successful attack by the French on the German trenches north of Deadman's Hill, resulted in the capture of a German trench, seven machine guns and a number of prisoners.

On the Italian front the Austrians claim to be making progress and adding to their prisoners.

In South Africa the South African troops have reached the German entrenchments in the invasion of German territory.

Norway has lost 62 vessels at the German hands since the war began.

TOWNSHEND'S MEN DYING OF HUNGER BEFORE SURRENDER

New York, May 30.—The Evening World-to-day publishes the following: "Bombay, India, May 30.—Stories of the terrible suffering of the British and Indian soldiers and the inhabitants of Kut-el-Amara before Gen. Townshend gave up his gallant defence of the place, have been brought here by wounded and diseased prisoners who were exchanged for Turkish prisoners. The British wounded were faithfully ennobled. The whole garrison would have perished if Gen. Townshend had held out a few days longer. When the capitulation was signed, only six miles were left to feed the army and 20,000 of the civil population. When Townshend tried to send the Turkish civilians out into the Turkish lines, the Turks, hungry forty of them as a warning to the remainder to stay and consume the British food.

"Before the surrender, every cannon, projectile, rifle and cartridge was destroyed. A diary of the siege shows only suffering for food. Before the surrender, a dead officer's kit was sold. Eighty dollars was paid for a box of cigars and \$20 for fifty American cigarettes.

"In February the rations daily consisted of a pound of barley meal bread and a pound and a quarter of mule or horse flesh. In April it was four ounces of bread and a pound of flesh. The supply of bread to the British soldiers was even lower, since the Indians would not eat the meat because of their religion. Disease spread among the horses and hundreds had to be shot, 2,000 also being killed because there was no grain for them, the fattest were kept for 45 days for food. In February scurvy appeared and when British aeroplanes dropped seeds Townshend turned his army into gardens. Mill stones, too, were dropped from aeroplanes to grind flour. Stray cats furnished a delicate 'wild rabbit supper'."

Grass was cooked as a vegetable and ginger root, boiled, acted as a substitute for tea and coffee. Later aeroplanes dropped some corn, flour, cocoa, sugar, tea and cigarettes, but this went to the wounded alone.

WESTMORLAND VOTES FOR CLEAN GOVERNMENT

Mahoney, Conservative, Defeated by Smith, Liberal by 81 Majority.—A Hard Fight

The electors of Westmorland did their duty by electing Dr. E. A. Smith, the opposition candidate.

They served notice upon New Brunswick and all Canada that their public conscience is alive to what is right and what is wrong in government methods. They did a greater thing in refusing to endorse the present corrupt administration of New Brunswick by refusing to elect the new minister of public works.

The contest was not between two men as individuals; it was between right and wrong as represented by Dr. Smith and P. G. Mahoney. The result—a majority of eighty-one for Dr. Smith, the opposition candidate—was achieved in the face of unreasonable odds.

Messrs. Woods and Price, M.P.P.'s, stood at a Salisbury parish poll yesterday, and were beaten by twenty-two votes.

Dr. Burke, the member for Kent, did the same at Memramcook, and was beaten 132 votes.

The forces at Shediac were buttressed by Dr. Landry and Speaker Melanson, and were beaten fifteen votes in that parish.

Had the people been permitted to go to the polls without being influenced, Smith would have won by a thousand votes.
