THE EXPLOSIVE BILL PASSED. The Measure Rushed Through in One

Afternoon. London, April 9-The government's bill introduced into the house of commons this at Rideau hall

afternoon relative to explosives provides that the maximum penalty for causing explosion by which life or property is impetilled shall be life-long servitude. The

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attempt to cause explosion, or making or keeping explosives with intent to cause exkeeping explosives with intent to cause ex-plosion, is made punishable by improson-ment for twenty years, and the unlawful making or keeping of explosives under sus-picious circumstances will be punishable by fourtees years' imprisonment. All acces-sories to such crimes will be treated as prin-circule. The bill provides for ordering offisories to such crimes will be treated as prin-cipals. The bill provides for o dering offi-cial inquiry into the crimes specified, for the arrest of absconding witnesses and for the searching for explosives. The penalties will be inflicted irrespective of the damage

done by explosives. The bill was read a first time, passed through committees of the whole, progress was reported, and, amid cheers from all parts of the house, received its third reading and breame law. The prompt action surprised the government
