Grand Opera House.
There will be two new faces seen in the Coghlan Company at the Grand Opera House next Monday evening. Among the members of the company who are to appear in Sardou's great play, "Diplomacy," are two ladies who, although they have never previously played in Toronto, have earned great reputations in Europe and the United States. Miss Sadie Martin's name is known in Canada, though the present is the first season of her appearance here. She has appeared in opera both in England and the United States. Last season she starred in a dramatization of some of the incidents of the celebrated mistle of Louis XIV., "Mme. Pompadour." It is only a few years ago that she was made a big offer by Coghlan to support him during his South American tour as leading lady. Miss Van Trantman, though of mature years, has made a tremendous reputation in the leading Viennese theatres. She has also starred through America in some of the best of the leading female roles being played in both the Austrian and English languages. As with Miss Martin's name, Miss Van Trantman, though they have acted for years in the United States the present time is their first attempt across the border.
