In order to meet this, Dr. Oronhyatekha met the High Court of Illinois at Joliet, Ill., on Tuesday and revoked the charter thus dissolving the High Court, but on Wednesday called the brethren to Chicago and formed a new High Court under the license granted by the Insurance Department of the State last week to the Supreme Court; so that the I.O.F. will work in Illinois from this time forward under legal authority. Already five or six subordinate courts of the Illinois Foresters have made application for admission into the I.O.F. and it is expected within the next three or four months that eight or ten thousand of the Illinois Foresters will be taken into the ranks of Independent Forestry. 
