The following lettor appeari in the Montreal Garette:
S:R, If a doubt ever exiated in the mind of any one, is to the propriety c! our government adopting the auggention of the Hoa. Mr. Joly to incrome the oxport duty on anw loga, it would be removed by knowing in what light exiating aniangemente are viewed by Michignan lumbermen. In the last inaue of the Lumberman's Gaxtue, ol Bay City, Michigan, Col. M. Jeffors, of East Saginaw, mays:-"I have bought from parties in Canada 500,000 acrea or twenty townaipe, of standiag white pine on the Serpent, Spaniab and Muananga rivers, Georginn Bey." Thie tract oontain. 2,$000,000,000$ feet of pine timber with a saw mill at the mouth of Serpent river that cuta 40,000 . 000 feet a year, with an iron stammor and a tow of bargea. The whole plant costing 8100 , 000." And alter stating that Governor Alger of Michigan, and Col. Blise, of Suginaw, are interested in the same region, he saya: "We propose to bring the logs over and saw them in Alichigan. Wo aro Michigan men and hope to make our purchnees inure to the bonefit of our penple here. Notwithatanding our investments in Canada, we atill stand by protection for Michigan lumber."
In another part of the same paper the Hon. Isace M. Weston, when criticising the Morrison Tariff bill, says:-"Wo now admit Canadian loge free of duty. On the north shore oi Lake Erie Canedian saw mills are in ruins, but the milla at Tonaranda, N. Y., are employing thousands of American workmen, manufacturing Canadian logs towed from the Erie north shore. The Saginaw mills are runuing out of American atock and already they aro looking to Georgian Bay for Canadian logs to ciose the Huron laide and keop their mills and men at work."
So that the advantages Canada is to derive from sales of her timber lands to. Col. Jeffers, the Governor of Michigan, Col. Bliss and others, is to have "her baw mills in' ruins. her workinen out of employment and ber timber towed over to Michigan, to be there made into lumber to compete with lumber manufactured in Canmela, at a disadvantage of $\$ 2$ per thous. and U. S. duty-all in the intercests of these gentlemen, who, not satisfed with therr rood investments in Cayadian timber, boast of their hostility to Canadian interests. No, gentlemen, not quite so fast, as Canadians we srealightly interested in this matter and will try to have "our timber inure to our people here," and "still stand by the protection of Canadian lumler." We havo no special desire that Cana dian saw mills should be in ruins," in order that "Now York (or Michigan) baw mills may employ thousands of American workmen man ufacturing Canadian logs." If we cannot have reo trade in lumber with you, let us have fair trade, cast in your lot with us, manufacture the lumber hare, and enjoy equally with ourselves the privilege of contributing $\$ 2$ per $M$ to the revenues of your country on any lumber sent chere. It is bad enough to have our tim. ber pans into the possession of strangers at a tithe of its value, but the country should at least be entitled to what little benefit it might derive from having the timber manufactured hers. We have $n$,t such a supurabundance of pine timber left that we can afford to part with it entirely in the intercst of our cousins acrose the line, however mucb wo may admire thoir disinterestednces in relieving us of it now that they acknowledge they have about uned up their own.
The United States tariff on Canadian lumber is $\varepsilon 2$ par M. The Canadian export duty on anw loge is $\$ 1$ per M. And aince the United Stales Government admit loga free, there is a clear advantage of $\$ 1$ per $M$ in favor of manu. facturing Canadian logs in the United Statea, This discrimination against ourselves the Mich igan lumbermen, who control the action of Congrous by prerenting the removal of duties from lumber, fatter themselves will be quietly submitted to by us, but it is well to let them know at once and distinctly that whila we are now, and havoat all timee been, roady to remore the axport duty on saw logs when the Unitod Statem lumbermen permit their Marvasta
