DIOCESE OF PETERBOROUGH

Landsey, Jan. 16. — The people of St. Mary's Parish have been sorely tried of late in having to endure the severance of cherished relations with two beloved priests. Barely three months ago Rev. Father Phelan, who had ably assisted the late Mr. Lamont in ministering to the spiritual and other needs of the congregation—one of the largest in Ontario—was called by His Lordship Bishop O'Connor, to labor elsewhere, and his departure was made the occasion of a remarkable demonstration of affection by the parishioners, who during the four years of his stay in their midst had grown to love him with a strength only inferior to that of the bond existing between the people and their long faithful pastor and adviser, Mgr. Laurent.

Little did those who participated in that sad leave-taking think that in a few short months Rev. Fr. Phelan would again be in their midst to assuage the deep grief aroused by the saddest occurrence since the passing away of Father Stafford—the death of the good Mgr. Laurent. Bishop O'Connor, knowing the tender relations that had existed between Father Phelan and the congregation again transferred him to Lindsay to administer the affairs of the parish pending the selection of a permanent pastor. The Bishop's choice was a wise one, Father Phelan being peculiarly fitted for the charge by reason of his knowledge of the parish affairs, the deep-rooted and tender friendship that had existed between Mgr. Laurent and himself, and also because his generous, sympathetic nature ever responded readily to sorrow with gentle and reassuring words.

Father Phelan has been transferred to the parish of Young's Point, where Father Fitzpatrick has labored for some years.

When the news was made public the members of the congregation held a meeting, and resolved to again mark in a fitting manner their high appreciation of Father Phelan's performance of his priestly duties and his good qualities as a man. The plans culminated last evening, when at the Parish Hall Father Phelan was made the recipient of several addresses, a purse containing \$80 in gold from the ladies and a handsome oak secretary and chair from the men of the parish.

The Parish Hall was crowded to the doors, between two and three hundred parishioners and a number of Father Phelan's Protestant friends being present, when Mr. A. P. Devlin, chairman, called the gathering to order. Mr. E. W. Cain, headmaster of the Separate School, read a fitting address to Father Phelan signed by the following representatives of the congregation: Messrs. A. P. Devlin, Wm. Steers, P. J. Hurley, L. V. O'Connor, E. J. Kingsley, Dan O'Connell, W. C. Cain, A. Primeau, C. Callaghan, A. O'Loughlin, James Killen, W. F. O'Boyle, Jas. Greenan and many others.

Miss A. O'Connor next stepped forward and read a touching address from the ladies of the congregation, Miss Gillogly presenting the purse and gift of altar linen.

Father Phelan, on rising to reply to the addresses, was visibly affected and it was some minutes before he succeeded in regaining his composure. His remarks were substantially as follows:

My Dear Friends, Ladies and Gentlemen of Lindsay—Yes, indeed, there are occasions in the life of man when the full realization of his position is to give, proper and fitting to his feelings.

But, my dear people, such an about-face has arisen with me. Less than three months ago, when at the summons of His Lordship, Bishop O'Connor, I was translated to Peterborough, and in good-holy seal and heartfelt gratitude you assembled in this same hall and made such a magnificent offering, accompanied with such good wishes, little did I think that such a short time was to elapse before my return. But the Angel of Death, with his ever inevitable hand, seized upon the good Monsignor in the zenith of his priestly glory, thus effecting the sad occasion of my recall to Lindsay parish.

You have credited me with many talents and qualities of which I feel I am not the possessor. For four years I have been amongst you, endeavoring to discharge the priestly functions of laboring for the glory of God and the salvation of souls. If in my work I have had any success, you must remember that I had as adviser and tutor that eminent divine, the late lamented Monsignor Laurent.

While amongst you, my good people, you have opened your hearts in many ways, leaving upon me everlasting impressions of practical illustrations forming the inestimable bond which ties the priest to his people. The chaste affection and co-operation of the people of Lindsay I have always shared, for which you will always have my blessing and thoughts in the sacrifice on God's holy altar. I am delighted to see present a number of Lindsay friends who are not

of our belief. It is an undoubted evidence of the good will and harmony that prevails in this community. For my Protestant friends I hold the greatest respect and kindest wishes. May such harmonious feelings ever exist, and the blessing of the King of Kings be ever on you.

I cannot give suitable expression to my thoughts and feelings to-night. Your two beautifully arranged addresses have pictured me as I should be, not as I am. To the ladies of the parish I am deeply grateful for the kind words, generous gifts, and above all, their expressed good will. To the men my thanks are many for their excessive generosity, their kind references and gracious blessings.

Of Lindsay and its associations I will always cherish the fondest recollections and constantly keep in mind the many evidences of your love and strong attachment.

In conclusion, I again thank you and ask you to remember me in your daily prayers. Bidding you farewell, and wishing you the choicest blessings of the Almighty, I express the fondest hope of man—that we shall all meet on that radiant shore.

Among the other speakers were Messrs. O. Bigelow, W. C. Cain, A. D. Mallon, H. J. Lytle, G. H. M. Baker, W. F. O'Boyle, A. P. Devlin and Wm. Steers. "God Save the King" brought the pleasant affair to a close.

The same evening Father Phelan was welcomed by the ladies of St. Mary's Sodality, who presented the following address and a full set of Faber's Works in handsome binding.

D., was present and delivered a most eloquent sermon.

MR. MOYLAN DIES SUDDENLY

Ottawa, Jan. 20.—Mr. J. G. Moylan, an old Catholic newspaper editor, died here on Saturday night. Since his retirement from the inspectorship of penitentiaries, a few years ago, Mr. Moylan has lived a quiet life in Ottawa. He leaves a widow and two daughters, one of whom is Mrs. Philpotts, wife of the manager of the Bank of British North America at Kingston. Mr. Moylan's death was sudden. He spent Saturday evening playing cards with his family, and went upstairs about ten o'clock to take a cold bath. He had been frequently warned against this, and his physician states that the sudden shock stopped the heart's action. Mr. Moylan passed away before the doctor, who lives only four houses away, could arrive.

After a newspaper career in the United States, Mr. Moylan established the Canadian Freeman in Toronto, and continued as editor and publisher up to 1873. In 1889 he was sent by the late Sir John A. Macdonald to Ireland as Dominion Emigration Commissioner. In 1872 he became a member of the Board of Penitentiary Directors, and three years later, on the abolition of the Board, he was appointed sole inspector of the penitentiaries for the Dominion. He retained this office till 1895, when he retired on a pension.

DEATH OF MRS. REGAN.

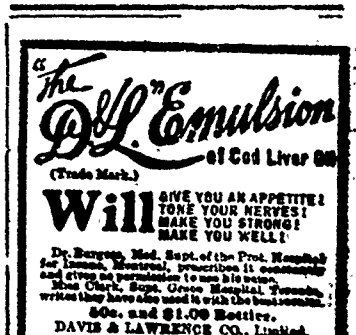
Mrs. Mary Regan, widow of the late John Regan, died on Saturday last, at her residence, 72 Monroe street.

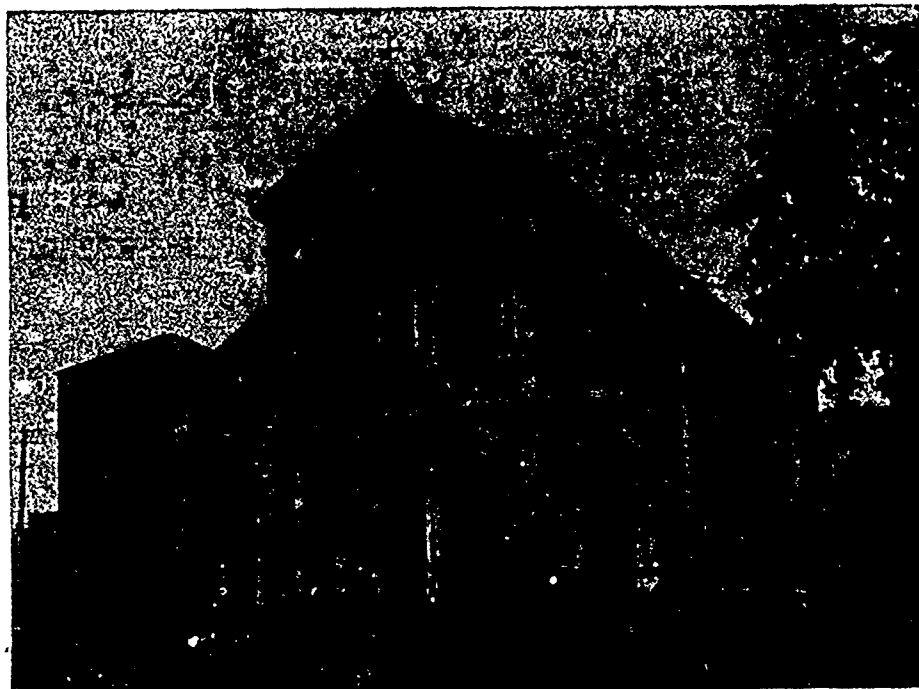
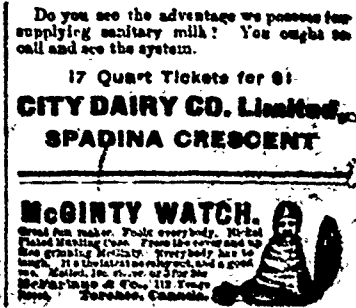

MR. HARTY'S MAJORITY 752.

Kingston, Jan. 15.—Kingston today elected Hon. Wm. Harty, the Liberal candidate, to fill the vacancy in the Dominion House caused by the elevation of Mr. Britton to the bench. The ex-Minister of Public Works of the Ontario Government defeated Mr. Jas. H. Metcalfe, the Conservative standard bearer, by 752 majority. The total vote was Harty, 2,117; Metcalfe, 1,365. Mr. Metcalfe depended almost entirely upon a sympathetic vote, and also believed that he had never been defeated in his political career of sixteen years he was invincible.

CANADIAN NATIONAL ANTHEM.

The Enseignement Primaire, a Quebec journal, publishes the following national anthem, composed by Mr. F. Normand, organist at Charlesbourg, near Quebec, and referring to the composition, it says: "This national anthem deserves to be adopted by all Canadians. The words are simple, beautiful and Christian. The anthem is sung to a well-known air 'God Save the King.' We trust that the teachers will make it a duty to teach the children this anthem and make them sing it often in schools."
