A VERY successful meeting of the S. S. Association of North York was held Jan. 17th and 18th, at Bond Head, Mr. E. Garrett, of the Bradford Witness, and Mr. W. W. Fraser, in addition to the local clergy, taking a prominent part.

THE new church on the 5th concession of Mersea township, Presbytery of Chatham, was opened Monday, January 21st. Rev. John Gray, M.A., of Windsor, conducting the services. In the evening a tea-meeting was held. The church is clear of debt.

AT the Sabbath-school anniversary of Knox church, Scarborough, held on Jan. 15th, the pastor, Rev. J. MacKay, B.A., was presented by the congregation with a very handsome outfit of furs, consisting of coat, cap and gauntlets of Persian lamb, accompanied by an address, expressive of the high regard in which he is held.

THE ladies of the Whitey Auxiliary, W.P.M.S., met in the manse on January 14th. Mrs. Gordon, the president, in the name of the members, presented Mrs. Abraham, the wife of the esteemed pastor of St. Andrew's, with a Life Member's Certificate. Mr. Abraham made a suitable reply. It may be mentioned that the Whitey Auxiliary, which consists of twenty-three members, raised during the year \$120 for Missions, and forwarded about twenty-five dollars worth of clothing to the Indian schools in the North-west.

THE annual meeting of St. Andrew's congregation, Perth, Rev. A. H. Scott, pastor, was held in the church, January 27th and 28th.

was handled by the Managing Board. The Mission Board supported a missionary itself for the summer in the North-west. In connection with the Home Mission work of the Church. To purposes outside of the congregation over \$2,000 were given. The congregation has decided to proceed at once with the erection of a new church, which will be an ornament to the town and a credit to the congregation. At the meeting, a subscription list was opened, and nearly \$5,000 subscribed. A committee was appointed to take initiatory steps for the new structure.

A CORRESPONDENT writes to the REVIEW:—"The year 1888 has been a prosperous one for Knox church, Sutton West and Cooke's church, Pefferlaw, under the pastorate of Rev. J. Frazer. The year opened with a gracious revival, by which the household of faith was refreshed, and many who long time had sat in darkness, were brought to rejoice in the light. Forty persons were added to the church during the year on profession of faith. This is the first year of the charge as a self-sustaining congregation, and the effort has been crowned with success. The Sutton church was re-seated to give additional seating accommodation, and the building thoroughly renewed, at a cost of about \$800. A new shed, 100 feet long, was built; and though Cooke's church was destroyed (by lightning), the Pefferlaw section are about ready to put up a handsome new church in the summer. The contributions for the Schemes of the Church have not suffered on account of all the additional work, but are in advance of last year. The reopening services of Knox church were held on Dec. 16th. When the morning service was conducted by the Rev. David Watson, D.D., of Beaverton, who not only opened Knox church twenty-five years ago, but preached his first sermon to this congregation some time previous. Rev. D. Cattanech (Methodist), Sutton, preached in the afternoon, and Rev. James Little, M.A., Toronto, in the evening. All the services were well attended, though the day was far from favourable. It is with thankful hearts and fresh courage we go forth to the work of a new year."
