rule for some time past. The log drives are ue yet in an unceriam position, and should any number of them be tied up sharp advance in white pine lumber would be the result. There has been litseral buying by C'nited Staten firmm, it bemg extimated that over $100,000,0 m$ fect of this seasong cut has been taken for whipment to Saginaw and Bay Cuy. There is cunowerable actisily in hardwoods. Dealers are open for stocks and manufacturer are anxious to clean up their yards, if possible, before gelting into the nem cut. This accounts for some irregularity in quotations. The shingle market is uncertain Manufacturers of white pine thingles have not lowered their prices but competition from the British Columbia product is being felt quite keenly, Presen' prices of $R$. C. shingles for Ontario delivery are: $\mathbf{X X X}, \mathbf{\$ 2 . 9 5}$; $\mathbf{X X X X}$, \$3.15: XXXXX, \$3.50.

QUEBEC AND NEW BRENSWICK.
The prornects for a fair demand for lumber for local consumpion are quite favorable. Huying is proceeding with some activity and prices are ruling firm. Common lumber leads bath in demand and price, quotations bring silightly in advance of those ruling last fall. This is not the case with the higher grades of Jumber, which have been affecled by the talling off in the export businese. In Montreal ronie anxiety is displayed on account of the attitude taken by some of the trade unions in demanding an unreagonable scuie of wages for the coming samson. A tew minor strikes have tlready taken place, but it is hoped that a satisfactory settlement in all instances may be reached at an early date so that buildirg operations mav not te seriously intertered with. local trade in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia has improved during the past week, but the lumber matket as a whole is unsettled. Morchantable spruce logs haves sold at Fredericton within the layt few davant \$9. 25 for the usand feet. This is a decline of $\$ 1.50$ as compared with one vear ago, and reflects the depression a hich prevalls in the Brilisi trade. The shingle market is firm, with New Branewich extra cedars offered al $\$ 3.45$ for Boston delivery.

## UNITED statrs.

Fine weather has had its effect and imparted a more bunyant sone to the iumber market. Retail dealers are placing orders gute liherally and are accepting quotations much smare promplly than earlier in the season. In inclination is shoun to $f^{\text {ut }}$ stocks in whape o handle the spank
and summer trade, which is expected to be of normal proportions. The quantity of unsold stork at the mille is now very llxht and dealery are finding yome difficully in locuting certain grades. There will be a plentiful rupply as soon hs the new cut is in shipping condition, but the fact that much of the early output of tbe mills has been coniracted for gives a very firm tone to such grudes an are in light supply. In the coarse grades of pinc the bux requirement has absorbed everylling avalable, while Norway piece stuff has bean beacfitied by tha resuinption of building operations on a larxe scale. There will be a heavy movement of lumbx $r$ from the Lake Superior district to the wholosale distributing centres in the east, but as retail dealers are practically bare of stock no abnormal accumulation is likely to result. Among the hardwoods, bamswood is showing a little weaknoes, bill not suff cient to caume ady amxioty, as the preeent condition of suppl; and demand will prevent more than temporary deprensics. Bircp atill sells readily, and the demand for lath is picking up.

## gRrat hritian.

The slight improvement in the Rritish lumber trade continues. The most lavorabie development of the past woek has been an increased consumption. The deliveries from the dock: have been quite large and the demand decidedly better than it bas been for some time past. There bas not been much improvement in prices, bowever, althnugh the results of recent salez indicete a hardening tendency tor some lines. The recent trop in prices made by Swedish shippers has encouraged buyers 20 place contracts, although a tew are still holding off in the bope of buying at rock bottom. Nevertheless, a large quantity of stocis has been placed du.ing the past fortnight, and there is no doubt that the feeling in regard to the future is more honeful. As for Canadian lumber the better qualities of pine deals are meeting with some demand and pine stock boards and sidings are enquired for frequentiy. $T$ i re is aso some enquiry for Quabec spruce cieals, but huyers are still fighting the prices asked by shippers, which are aboul 49 per slandard for thirds.

Canadian lumber has figured prominently in recent public salem. Messrs. H. s. G. Curven, of Presion and Fleetwood, sold a quantity of $Q u e b e c$ pine sidings, said io contain 80 per cent. of first quality, said to contain 80 per cent. offirat quadity, at from $£ 20103$ to $\mathbf{E 2 4} 103$ per standard, and a lot of strictly first quality at $\boldsymbol{\chi}, 27$ to fi8. These prices are low as compared with what ix asket for this season's de-
liverien. At Mansra. Farnworth and Jardine's male at Liverpuol, socond quali., pine deals, $3 x 11$ itich, brought 216 and third quality $6125^{\text {m. . Red pine deais }}$ sold at fio ion. qine scatrimga, $3 x$, 6 inch, third quality, broughi from Co to 29 12n. 6ud.
