#### Gleanings.

An Army Floral Association has been organized in London for the sale of flowers in the streets by old soldiers.

An old soldier named Thos. Palmer, late of the 32nd Regt., and presumed to be the last of those who fought under Sir John Moore at Corunna, has recently died at Weston-super-Mare, England, in his 100th year.

The Duke of Cambridge is to go to Brussels in June to unveil the monument which has been erected in the principal cemetery there over the graves of the British officers who died of wounds received at Quatre Brais and Waterloo.

For the first time in the history of naval shipbuilding, the British Admiralty has taken the country into its confidence, as regards a proposed constructive programme, and laid its designs for a series of new battleships before the Institute of Naval Architects.

Von Moltke, it is said, is strongly against entrusting private soldiers with a rifle which can be fired too easily.

Misfortune will certainly fall upon the land, where the wealth of the tax gatherer or the greedy gambler in stocks stands, in public estimation, above the uniform of the brave man who sacrifices his life, health, or fortune to the defence of his country.—*Jomini*.

Orders have been given, says the Odessa correspondent of the Daily News, for the construction of two new war vessels to be commenced at once for the Black Sea. They are to be of the same type as the one at present on the stocks at Nicolaieff. The new vessels are to be of 11,000 tons.

Vice Admiral Tchikhatcheff, Russian Minister of Marine, has, it is reported, laid before the Czar a report upon the Russian Navy, in which he emphasises the urgency for the construction of a large number of cruisers, and oppose the projected increase of the flotilla stationed in the rivers running into the Black Sea.

A compass has just been invented by Capt. Willoughby Verner, cf the British Army. It has the points engraved on the outside of a bronze case, and by adjusting a line to the objective point, the direction of the march is indicated in a luminous fashion. It is now undergoing official testing, with a view to its immediate adoption in the Army.
