The Secretary of State for External Affairs and the Minister of Trade and Commerce announced today that approval has been given to Canadian representation at the Sixth Decennial Conference for the Revision of the International Lists of Diseases and Causes of Death, to be held in Paris from April 25 to April 30, 1948. This Sixth Decennial Conference which will be attended by representatives of most of the nations of the world will be the culmination of the statistical study of diseases and causes of death which has now been in progress for more than a century. The accurate study of the incidence of diseases and of the causes of death is dependent upon the use of a uniform classification. Attempts to establish a uniform classification have been made at various International Statistical Congresses since 1853; and the most recent revision of the International Lists of Causes of Death dates from 1933 when for the fifth time revision was made by international agreement.

As a consequence of agreements which will probably be reached in Paris toward the end of this month, there will undoubtedly result a great improvement in the international comparability of illness statistics, and a more refined comparison of mortality with morbidity will be possible. Among the subjects to be discussed at the forthcoming Revision Conference will be the following:

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
