can be made. If we are going to have any law in regard to this important point it has to be perfectly clear what is meant by a student who is registered.

The bill goes on to refer to a recognized educational institution. There might be various criteria by which one could decide what kind of institution should be regarded as a recognized educational institution. In order that the bill should be better, it should set forth the tests defining what is a recognized educational institution.

There is another point in the hon. member's bill which seems somewhat defective. The hon. member talks about a student who is duly registered and in attendance at a recognized educational institution, but he does not go on directly to say that the institution must be in a constituency in which the student is not ordinarily resident. This is implied by a later part of his proposed amendment; but it should be perfectly clear that this would apply only in the case of a student engaged in a full-time program of study at a properly defined university.
