The Solicitor General of Canada and Minister of State for Agriculture (Mr. Blais) made the announcement last Friday afternoon in Abitibi-Témiscamingue on behalf of the Minister of Regional Industrial Expansion and Minister of State for Science and Technology (Mr. Andre).

At the same time, the Minister, Mr. Blais, met the CRAAT and UPA together with dairy farmers.

# FISHERIES

### GREAT LAKES-CONTROL OF SEA LAMPREY

**Mr. Maurice Foster (Algoma):** Mr. Speaker, I wish to bring to the attention of the House a serious problem related to the long-term future of commercial and tourist fishing in the Great Lakes. The Government, by failing to increase funding to control the sea lamprey infestation in the Great Lakes, is endangering the viability of these multi-billion dollar industries.

Sea lamprey control in Lake Erie will be totally eliminated and control in Lake Michigan, Lake Huron, and Lake Ontario will be cut by 50 per cent. Research will be cut by 50 per cent, and the resulting impacts will be that the number of lamprey will double by the year 2000, trout and salmon will decline by 50 per cent, whitefish and chub stocks will decline, sport fishing
