> I received a communication from an old friend, Mr. F. W. Harcourt, a member of the firm of Osler, Hoskin & Harcourt, Solicitors, Toronto. Mr. Harcourt is the official guardian and has charge of the affairs of the Bickerstaff estate. It seems that William Bickerstaff, then aged 17, went from Toronto to the United States in June 1922 to look for employment, which ended in his enlistment in the 63rd Service Squadron, Francefield Canal Zone, Panama. Mr. Harcourt thinks the date of the enlistment was October or November 1922. His mother, Mrs. Bickerstaff is in great distress concerning the boy's enlistment and desires to have him discharged and returned to Toronto. Will you please have some officer on your staff tell me if it is possible for Mr. Bickerstaff to be discharged and if so, under what conditions.
