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creation (robbed of immoral accidents and pernicious tendency), allowance must be made for difference in ages, circumstances, and education, etc., as it "takes all kinds of people to make a world." So there are all kinds of Christians making up the "Church militant here on earth," and each individual, while being scrupulously particular about his own conduct in this matter, will not judge his brother in respect to his, unless it runs notoriously counter to all Christian profession and practice. Let him remember the keen rebuke of the apostle, whose conduct, influence, and personality have reached and affected all Christians the world has ever had or shall have, who never forgot "None of us liveth to himself" (Rom. xiv. 7), and vet who cried out in protest against the censorious judges of the early Roman Church : "Who art thou that judgest another man's servant? To his own master he standeth or falleth." (Rom. xiv. 4.) Every man in every matter must face his own individual

responsibility to God.
