CHICAGO, Feb. 6.—Because blizzards and extreme cold in the west threatened danger to autumn-sown wheat, prices today went to a higher level. Not all of the gain was held, but the market closed steady 4c to %c above last night. Corn finished %c to %c up, and oats at an advance of 4c to %c. In provisions, the outcome was a net decline of 2½c to 10c.

Speculators bullishly inclined had jumped at the conclusion that a decline in temperature, which went to 32 below zero in parts of Nebraska, would work serious damage to the crop. According to some authorities, fields where Snow had fallen were being swept bare by the gale. The rush to purchase, however, was moderated by reports from other places, where the snow averaged several inches in depth.

After the early bulge, conservatives were disposed to wait for more definite tidings in support of reported crop damage, especially as to Kansas. Predictions of yet lower temperatures ahead, tho, helped to avert any decided reaction.

OTTAWA. Feb. 6.—Rough handling and pilfering of perishable shipments will be made a criminal offence if an amendment, to be proposed by J. E. Armstrong of Lambton, becomes law. Under the Fruit Marks Act shippers are penalized if they do not pack their fruit in a certain way or up to a certain standard, yet the handling by express employes and others is often so rough that whole shipments are seriously damaged. The only redress is by the slow process of damage claims.
