

OTTAWA, Auz. 22.—His Royal Highness the Governor-General pro-rogued parliament this afternoon in a brief speech in which he commended the legislation which had been so promptly passed and expressed his hope that a favorable and honorable issue would be found for the war in which the empire was now engaged.
