When, therefore, a sinner is saved, it is not because of something which Christ is to do for him in the future, but in virtue of what He has done for him in the past.

Now, dear reader, what has Christ done for you in the past? You reply: "He died for me." True; but are you at this moment saved? "No," you say, "but I hope hereafter to be so." But why wait till the future? Why not believe and be saved 'now? Is it possible that when Christ has fulfilled all the righteousness, and borne all the wrath of the law for you in the past, you must still wait for some unknown time in the future before vou can be saved? Certainly not. "Now is the accepted time; now is the day of salvation." Only two reasons could possibly compel you to wait even till to-morrow for salvation, and these would be, either (1) that a sufficient sacrifice had yet to be made for all your sins, or (2) that a perfect satisfaction having been already offered, you had still to wait for an invitation from God to accept it. As regards the first, please with gratitude observe that a sacrifice so tremendous, so infinitely perfect, so eternal in all
