WEST TORONTO.

WEST TORONTO, March 9.—(Special.)—The death occurred this morning at the King Edward Sanatorium of Mr. William Fennel, son of the late, Ephraim Fennel, who was an old resident of the town and who used to reside on Lakeview-avenue. The deceased had been in business in Detroit for five years, but had recently come to the sanatorium on account of his failing health. He was but 29 years of age and leaves a widow and a little boy five years of age. The funeral will take place on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock from Speer's undertaking parlors to Mount Pleasant Cemetery. A reception was held last night in the basement of the Victoria Presbyterian Church to the new members of the congregation. Several speeches were made by prominent members of the church and a most enjoyable evening was spent by those present. At last the new public lavatory has been opened on Keele-street, just north of Dundas-street. The building has been constructed on the bridge principle and has been placed in charge of a night and day man.

WON'T STAND FOR ANY CHANGE.

Farmer Along York Township Will Oppose the Plans.

A month or so ago the Canadian Pacific Railway, thru their solicitor, Mr. McMurphy, wrote the Scarborough Township Council with reference to some contemplated changes in the position of the railway bridge crossing the tracks near Wexford. The railway at this point runs in a northerly direction, but the position of the bridge is such that, running parallel with the York town line, there is a straight and uninterrupted highway. It is proposed to change this, placing the bridge at the same angle as the railway, which would create an unsightly and objectionable turn in the road. For a week or more the C.P.R. have had a man stationed at this point counting the vehicles passing over the bridge, presumably for presentation to the Dominion Railway Board in the event of the rejection of their plan. The Scarborough and York Township Councils, each of whom is interested in the highway, the census, too, is being taken at a time when the traffic, owing to the bad roads, is more than ordinarily light. If petitions are needed to frustrate the design of the C.P.R., they can be secured by the township people simply will not stand for any diversion of the old highway, however slight.
