

NEW YORK, Nov. 1.—The national board of the National Association of Professional Baseball Leagues ended the business of the annual meeting of the association to-day with a six hours' session, at which protests and appeals were considered.

The case of Mal. W. Eason, who was a pitcher for the Brooklyn Nationals, and was purchased by the Newark Club for \$500, was heard.

The Newark Club claimed it still had an equity in him. This contention was sustained. Eason had pitched just three innings in a game at Buffalo for the Newarks when his arm falled him. He was considered useless as a pitcher, and W. W. Burnham, owner of the Newark Club, allowed him to go to the Pennsylvania, Ohio and Maryland League as an umpire. To hold interest in him, the Newark Club suspended him, thus making it irregular for any other league club to attach him. Eason is to be allowed to work as a manager or umpire, with the privilege of obtaining his unconditional surrender by the payment of \$300 to the Newark Club.
