# SPAIN YIELDS A POIN

Grants An Armistice in Response to Pressure from the Powers.

## **CUBANS WILL NOT ACCEPT OLIVE BRANCH**

Cessation of Hostilities Said to Be Only for Five Days-A Condition is That the United States Shall Ceass Aiding the Insurgents-President's Address to Come To-Day, Just the Same-Matters Are Complicated.

Havana, April 10.-Nothing can better show the intensely bitter feeling entertained for Americans by Spanish officials here than the deliberate snubbing of Consul-Gen. Lee when he called at the palace to pay his respects to Capt. Gen. Blanco and the Governor-General of the Island before leaving for Key

Consul-Gen. Lee went to the palaceyesterday morning after having completed the transfer of the archives to the British Consulate and the packing up his own effects preparatory to leaving. Gen, Lee was accompanied by Mr. Conklin, the British Consul at Havana.

The call at the palace was very brief. The presence of the American Consul-General was made known to the Governor-General, but he sent back word that he was quite too busy to receive Gen. Lee, and so the Consul-General was forced to return to the Consulate and take down the American flag that has been flying there without the questionable pleasure of saying good-bye to the Spanish Governor.

The American flag upon the Consulate building was taken down by consular employes, and at 6 o'clock this evening General Lee and his staff, with Consuls Springer and Barker, left Havana on the lighthouse tender Fern. The wharf was crowded, but no discourtesy was shown.

THE ARMISTICE GRANTED.

Madrid, April 9.-3.15 p.m.-A visit of the Foreign Ambassadors to Senor Gullon, Minister of Foreign Affairs, resulted in a meeting of the Cabinet, at which a decision was reached to grant an armistice to the insurgents in Cuba. General Correa, Minister of War, after the council, which lasted two hours, said to the correspondent of the Associated Press:

"We yielded to the pressure of the Great Powers, granting what we had refused to the United States."

The ambassadors, collectively, called upon Senor Gullon, requesting that Spain grant the armistice so repeatedly begged for by the Pope. The Cabinet then met. General Correa, Minister of War, and Admiral Bermejo, Minister of Marine, objecting to the granting of an armistice, on the ground that it would be disparaging to the Spanish arms. The representative of Russia, as a military power, replied that he considered it would be no disparagement. Objection was again made, on the ground that there was no guarantee that the in surgents would accept an armistice. The representatives replied that in that case an armistice would mean only a suspension of hostilities, and insisted upon Spain offering to the insurgents a last chance of submission for the sake of negotiating peace. If the insurgents continue hostilities, the Spaniards would be allowed legitimate self-defence.

The Ministry then unanimously agreed that an armistice be granted THE MESSAGE GOES JUST THE SAME.

Washington, April 10.—The President will send in his message on Monday just the same. That message will not be changed or aftered in the slightest degree. The only thing that can change or delay, they say at the White House, will be the complete and absolute backdown of Spain.

The representatives of the Cuban Government say that all talk of an armistice is folly. They say the Cubans would refuse to negotiate along armistice lines. Senor Quesada said that the Cubans had gained their liberty, or it had been in their grasp and that they would not throw away the fruits of their years of fighting for promises from Spaniards.

"The Spaniards," he said, "have lied to us so many times that we believe nothing they say. They can trick us no more. They cannot lie to us again. We

will enter into no armistice agreement." SENATOR BURROWS ASKS A QUESTION.

Senator Burrows said that if a complete armistice is actually proclaimed. to cover a period of, say, thirty, sixty or ninety days, contemplating the cessation of hostilities, it might present a new and important phase of the situa-tion confronting the country. "For," he suggested, "it would mean a recognition of the belligerency of the Cubans, an official admission of the existence of war, and it is to be borne in mind that the object of our intervention is the procuring of peace. Now, are we justified in going into a war under the circumstances, when one of the parties offers to lay down its arms; and, as to the hona-fide intention of such a decree, are we to question the good faith of a country and ask if it means what it says? Negotiations with Washington regarding the regulations to be enforced at Wrangel took place long after the Mann-McKenzie deal, instead of long before, and what is the nature of the communication which Sir Julian Pauncefote has had to make to the Dominion authorities? In effect it is that the American Government takes a liberal view of the treaty of Washington, and is prepared not only to concede the "free navigation" of the Stikine, but transhipment at Wrangel without payment of duty.
