**INDIANS WHO ARE NEGROES
ROBBED OF THEIR LANDS**
Strange Results of the Adoption by
Tribes of Their Colored
Slaves.

Muscouge, I.T., Oct. 2.—In the first
place, it is negroes who are being
robbed, not Indians. A lot is heard
in the outside world about the Creek
"Indians," and a long-time habit of
thought is pretty certain to picture the
high cheekbones, the swarthy complex-
ion, the straight, aquiline nose—all
incidents of a stolid dignity wrapped
in a bright-colored blanket.

Wipe out that picture. Substitute a
lot of plantation "darker" in cheek
shirts and overalls; fill in the swarthy
"plebeianness," the big fat "mam-
mie" in gingham and sunbonnet, the
dog, a good many saddle ponies and
a lot of farm wagons, and get used to
the idea that these are the Indians of
the Creek tribe. There is not a trace
in the reservation you might travel
a thousand miles and not see a square
inch of bead work or a buckskin gar-
ment.

There are 15,000 so-called Creek
Indians, of whom fully 12,000 are
negroes, or of negro extraction. There
are about 300 "real-bloods," but they
are a retiring and inconspicuous
minority. They keep to their cabins
in the hills, and if one comes to town,
he will easily pass for the average
sun-browned farmer of the Caucasian
race.

Thirty years ago these negroes were
all slaves—the property of the Indians.
The Creeks, and the other four tribes,
the Choctaws, Chickasaws, Seminoles
and Chickasaws, lived in the south, in
Tennessee, Georgia and Florida, and
took on the ways of civilization. They
farmed, acquired money and bought
black men to do their work for them.
Then came the day when they were
moved west; they were moved out here
—so far west, as it appeared to the
people of those days, that they would
never be in the way any more. By
treaty they received these lands, and
a lot more to the west, and they took
their slaves with them.

Then came the war, and the fighting
extended west to the frontier, and the
five civilized tribes were compelled
to cast their fortunes with one or the
other of the combatants. Most of
them were swayed by their early affilia-
tions, and went with the south. Af-
ter the war came reconstruction. The
Indians were adjudged to have forfeit-
ed their treaty rights by insurrec-
tion, and new treaties had to be nego-
tiated. Slavery was abolished, and the
Indians were compelled to face the
problem of what to do with their dark-
ies.

Former Slaves Adopted.
Three of the tribes—the Creeks, Semi-
noles and Choctaws—decided to adopt
the freedmen as members of their
tribes, giving them equal rights with
themselves. The Choctaws, Seminoles
and Chickasaws did not give them citi-
zenship, but presented to each former slave
fifty acres of land. In Indian
territory are a few ex-slaves who re-
sisted the reconstruction dream of the
race—for the male was quite easy to
procure.

YANKEES BOW THEIR KNEES

The Honorable Artillery Parade the
Streets and Receive Much
Attention.

Boston, Oct. 2.—For the first time
in many years, the flag of England,
the British flag, is escorted by the
Honorable Artillery Company of
London, as special guests of the Au-
thorities and Honorable Artillery Company
of this city.

Landing at Charlestown almost on
the very spot where their ancestors
started on their memorable attack on
Bunker Hill, 128 years ago, the red
coats of the twentieth century marched
from the steamer, the Mayflower, over
the bridge to Boston, and then thro'
the streets, resplendent with American
and British flags, to the hotels, which
will be their homes during their visit.
For five days they will be entertained,
then setting company to include
New York, Washington, Niagara Falls
and Canada, they will return to Eng-
land.

The Mayflower was sighted coming
into Massachusetts Bay early in the
forenoon. Col. Smith, the com-
mander of the Ancient and Honorable
Artillery, accompanied by several of
his staff, boarded the ship, and
welcomed the visitors thro'
their commander, the Earl of Pembroke.
The Mayflower was given a hearty
welcome at the harbor, and before
the visitors landed, Adjutant Gen-
eral Dalton boarded the steamer and
extended in behalf of Governor Bates
the official welcome of the commu-
nity of Massachusetts. As the vis-
itors landed and had formed their line,
the procession started.

The parade was most spectacular,
the showy uniforms of the regiments,
the music of the militia, the scarlet of
the National Lancers contributing to the
splendor of the occasion. The parade
was held on the north side of the main
streets, and across Boston Com-
mon, the parade was witnessed. Along
the route many business houses were
decorated and crowds which thronged
the streets cheered and applauded the
visitors. The first entertainment for
the visitors will be a smoke in Faneuil
Hall tonight.
