PURSuing THE FILIPINOS

The U. S. Army Still Sweeping Onward.

Scenes of Desolation on Every Hand.

Country Looks as if Swept by a Hurricane—U. S. Cabinet Summoned—Intimation That More Men May Be Called Out.

Manila, March 29—Noon.—The American army advanced at 6 o'clock this morning, sweeping onward three miles before 10 o'clock, and driving the rebels beyond Bocave, to the east of Bulacan and on the railroad leading to Malolos. Our troops met with but slight resistance.

The Filipinos fired volleys yesterday evening for the purpose of drawing the American fire, and disclosing the locality of our positions. Two men of the Pennsylvania Regiment and one man belonging to the Dakota Regiment were wounded. The Americans remained silent.

PICTURE OF DESOLATION
The country between Maricao and Manila presents a picture of desolation. Smoke is curling from hundreds of ash heaps, and the remains of trees and fences torn by shrapnell are to be seen everywhere. The general appearance of the country is as if it had been swept by a cyclone. The roads are strewn with furniture and clothing, dropped in flight by the Filipinos. The only people remaining behind are a few aged persons, too infirm to escape. They camp beside the ruins of their former homes and beg passers-by for any kind of assistance. The majority of them are living on the generosity of our soldiers, who give them portions of their rations. The dogs of the Filipinos cower in the bushes, still terrified and barking, while hundreds of pigs are to be seen busily searching for food. Bodies of dead Filipinos are stranded in the shallows of the river, or are resting in the jungle, where they crawled to die, or were left in the wake of the hurriedly-retreating army. These bodies give forth a horrible odor, but there is no time, at present, to bury them.

PANIC-STRICKEN PEOPLE.
The inhabitants who fled from Maricao and Moynayan left in such a panic, that on the tables our soldiers found spread money and valuables, and in the rooms were trunks containing other property of value. This was the case in most of the houses deserted. They were not molested by the American soldiers, but the Chinese, who slip in between the armies, are looting when they can. They have taken possession of several houses, and over them raised Chinese flags, some of which were torn down. An old woman was found hidden in a house at Moynayan yesterday, just dead, apparently from fright and hunger.

DISPATCH FROM OTIS.
Washington, D. C., March 29.—The following cablegram from Gen. Otis has been received by Adjutant-General Corbin: "Manila, March 29.—McArthur advanced yesterday only to the outskirts of Maricao; took until late afternoon to repair road and railway bridges, and send cars through with supplies. Commenced at 6 this morning to march rapidly to Bocave, and will continue to Bigaa, seven miles from Malolos. We have destroyed railway and telegraph line; construction train following our forces. Enemy's resistance not very vigorous today. Our loss thus far slight. Towns in front of our advance being destroyed by fire. Troops in excellent spirits. (Signed) OTIS."

AMERICAN LOSSES.
A dispatch from Manila Tuesday says: "Information reaches here that indicates the insurgent capital has been moved from Malolos to San Fernando. A list prepared in the office of the United States adjutant-general shows the casualties at Manila since Feb. 4 to be 157 killed and 384 wounded."

CABINET SUMMONED.
Washington, D. C., March 29.—A cabinet meeting has been called. New York, March 29.—A Washington dispatch to the World says it is understood that the cabinet will meet today.

Marion Brown Found Guilty

Of the Murder of Michael Toohey on June 24, 1898.

Sentenced To Be Hanged on May 17.

Mr. McPhillips Berates the Police and Crown Officers.

Forcible Statement of the Case by Mr. Lount.

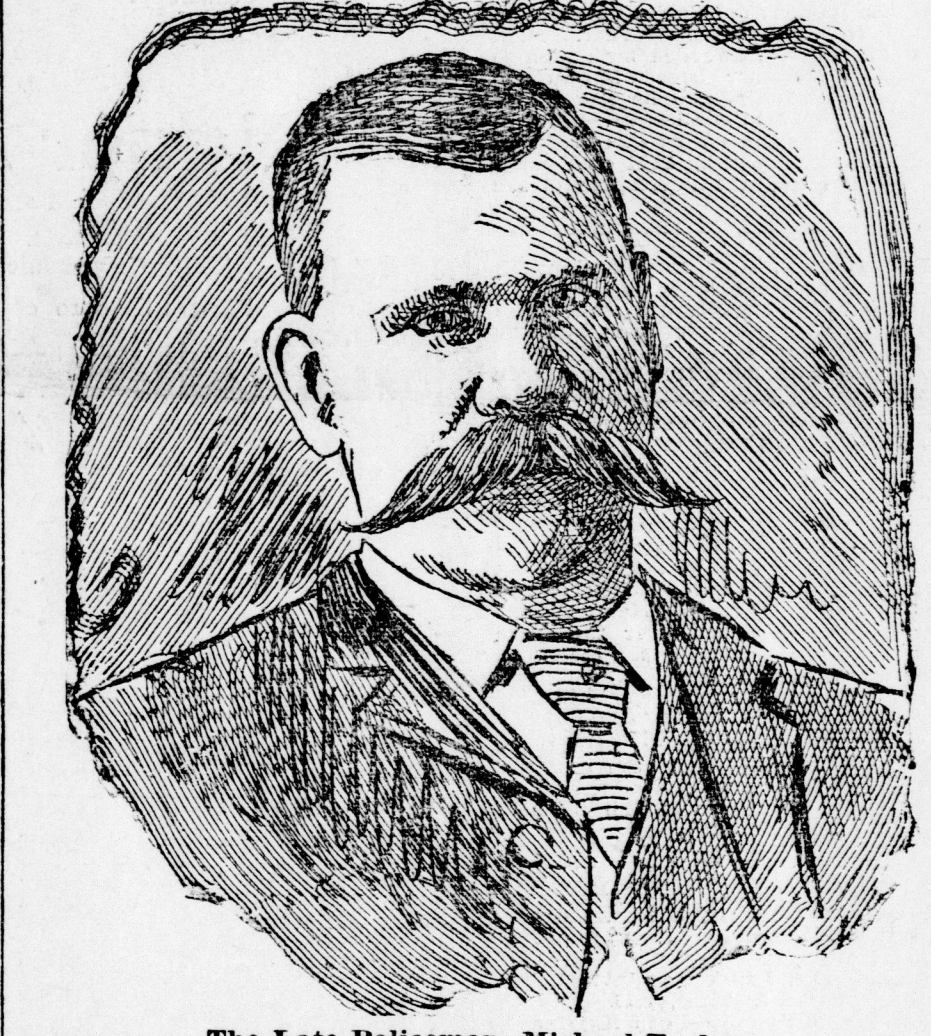
Judge MacMahon's Careful and Impartial Summary of the Evidence—Intense Interest Taken in the Proceedings.

Tuesday Afternoon.

It was somewhat of a surprise for the crown counsel yesterday when Mr. McPhillips announced that no witnesses would be called for the defense. There was a feeling of uncertainty as to what the prisoner's defense would be. There had been no hint thrown out by the prisoner's counsel, and the crown was satisfied to wait and see what time would bring forth. The prisoner's counsel

had been left out. They had seen how he had all along worked with difficulty and against odds in behalf of the prisoner at the bar. They had seen how the crown, from start to finish, had received every assistance. The police convicted the accused. He was not surprised at that, for it would have been an everlasting disgrace to the London police force if some one were not arrested for the murder of their comrade, Toohey. They arrested a man, but that man was not found in the city nor in the Province of Ontario, nor in the Dominion of Canada, but thousands of miles away, in Washington State. Somebody had to be arrested, somebody had to have the \$500 reward. The police were only too willing to pay the money. Why, he asked, was not Dilley, the United States marshal who made the arrest, brought here and put on the stand? He had no words of credit from the police force. They were not astute enough to follow the murderer. The jury had heard the evidence of Chief Williams and Geo. Campbell, who had found the tracks, and yet the man had not been followed up. It was a discredit and a disgrace to the police force of London that a man with the calibre and character that the slayer of Toohey is said to have had, should be allowed to escape so far from the place of the murder.

WITNESSES DISCREDITED.
Mr. McPhillips said the crown had

addressed the jury for 3 hours and 55 minutes, going over the evidence from start to finish. The counsel made some reference to Mr. Basham's evidence, and this called forth from Judge MacMahon the remark that Mr. McPhillips was placing the witness in a very unfair light. The address of Mr. Lount, the crown counsel, was dignified, pointed, and eloquent, and occupied about two hours. Throughout the two addresses the prisoner appeared to be greatly affected—a good deal more so than anyone else. A striking feature of the whole trial has been the unusually large attendance of ladies, and the absence of any evidence of sympathy. The Brown trial is in striking contrast with the Emerson trial. There were few dry eyes in the court when the addresses to the jury were being made, but yesterday there were no demonstrations of sympathy, and the only tear-stained face was that of the prisoner himself.

Mr. McPhillips began his address at 2 o'clock. He was sure the jury would join with him and the learned counsel for the defense and his lordship, in expressing congratulation that this case was drawing to a close. Of the many juries he (Mr. McPhillips) had addressed and had heard addressed, none was imbued with so much patience as the one before him now, and there never was a jury who had given better long attention to the evidence for six long days than the present one. He proposed to analyze the evidence and show why it should not receive credence. He did not know of a case on record where there was such a tangled maze of contradictory testimony as in this one. It was, he supposed, the longest murder trial (with one exception) in the history of this court house. He had been kept well within the bounds of the rules of evidence, but he had nothing to complain of from that score. All he asked was justice at their hands. They were charged with the highest duty which could possibly devolve upon the citizens of any country, and he would ask nothing at their hands but simple justice. He then paid a high compliment to Mr. Lount and the manner in which he had presented the evidence put into his hands. Mr. McPhillips referred to the long string of testimony which reached from Texas to London, and back again to North Yakima. Not one tittle that could be made use of

failed to produce a solitary witness who could speak positively as to the shooting. The defense had never denied that Brown had escaped from Georgetown, but had admitted the fact. Mr. McPhillips then took up the evidence of Mr. Basham and Mr. Smith, and spoke for half an hour of these witnesses. He commented on the evidence of Mrs. Humphrey, "the woman who never made a mistake in her life, except the time when she tried to keep a still tongue, and didn't succeed." He referred to Mr. Alberstadt's evidence as a piece of rot. If Mr. Ross's evidence was correct that he had been assaulted at not later than 8:20 p.m., the prisoner had gone so far as to identify the man, his hat, the peg-leg, and the whole business, at a distance of over 200 feet. He asked the jury if ever they had heard a man make such a mess of his evidence as Stokes. Such evidence should not be admissible where a man's life was at stake. Nulty, who was not so far away, could not identify the prisoner. Mrs. Short, he claimed, had come into the box prejudiced against the prisoner, and with a preconceived idea of his guilt. She was one of those positive witnesses who could not possibly be mistaken. He didn't like this kind of witness; she was infallible. That class of witness was commented on in the law books. All are human, and all likely to err. Adam and Eve had erred, and was Mrs. Short less susceptible to error and more infallible than our first parents? Edward Hayman's evidence should be discarded, because of the impossibility of some of the statements he had made.

TOOHEY'S PISTOL.
Referring to the finding of the revolver, Mr. McPhillips said the only intelligible and reasonable conclusion they could come to was that Toohey had the revolver in his own hand to shoot the peg-legged tramp, whoever he was. The crown might argue that the revolver was taken out of the pouch after the first shot was fired, but that was another impossibility. Toohey had gone after the tramp, revolver in hand, with the express intention shooting him. The prisoner's counsel reviewed the evidence of all the wit-

nesses regarding the white object seen north of the bush, and to the contradicted evidence of young McKerricher, who swore that on that night three soldiers passed him near the bush. Where were these men? Were they some persons who had enmity against the policeman. There was not one witness called to show where these

MYSTERIOUS MEN
had gone, nor who they were. According to McKerricher's evidence the peg-leg and the three mysterious men passed north at the same time. British law said that every man was innocent until proven guilty, and the prisoner should be given the advantage of every doubt. The prisoner, he claimed, was innocent, and he not only asked for an acquittal, but he demanded it. He said he need not tell the jury that the legal profession and the judiciary of this country and Great Britain were far excellence above those of other countries, and would not stoop to anything unfair. There were men, however, who would stoop to anything, who would reverse the famous British maxim so as to read: "A man is guilty until he proves himself innocent."

THE DEAD OFFICER'S TUNIC.
Mr. McPhillips then produced P. C. Toohey's tunic, and passed it to the

jury, asking them to examine it carefully and conclude whether or not the buttons had been cut off or pulled off for a reason.

Mr. McPhillips asked if the jury had ever heard of three men making such an exhibition of inhumanity in a community where justice and religion reigned as Gillies, Shaw and Fuller.

He referred to the active part taken in the case by Detective Nickle, and asked the jury to imagine they saw his good-looking friend coming back with the prisoner from his own country, without saying what he was coming for, and then ruthlessly placing his hand on the prisoner's shoulder and saying: "I arrest you on the charge of murder." The prisoner had been given no chance to avail himself of extradition proceedings. He was brought to a foreign country, among his enemies, without a dollar, to be tried for the most heinous of crimes. He asked for justice only. The black man had a heart as well as the white man. "Think," he said, "of that poor colored boy's mother, who may at this very moment be shedding tears for her son."

This reference to the prisoner's mother caused Brown to bow his head and burst into tears. He covered his face with his hands and wept like a child.

Continuing, Mr. McPhillips said the Good Book says that "no murderer can enter the kingdom of heaven." Condemn him and you consign him to perdition. He is placed in the most awful position God or man can place him. He asked the jury to acquit the pris-
