The Carolines Lost

From the Grasp of Spain.

Rival Kings Unite Their Forces and Defeat the Dons.

Story of the Attempt on Wilhel mina's Life Repeated.

One of the Shots Aimed at the Queen Wounded Her Companion.

About 600 Persons Perished in the Outbreak at Candia-The United States Will Not Accept Turkey's Repudiation of Responsibility for American Losses in Armenia.

The Caroline Islands, which belong to Spain, are undoubtedly by this time in the hands of the natives of the group, with the Spanish garrison wiped out. News of a revolution in the islands comes in letters from Honolulu by the steamer Coptic. The story was borne to Honolulu by a trading schooner.

Two native kings of the group, who had long been at war with each other, some months ago declared a truce, combined their forces and began a war against the Spanish authorities.

The Spaniards were concentrated at Ponape, and it was here the natives made their attack. The blacks fought with such vigor and in such numbers that the Spaniards were compelled to retreat and take shelter in the barracks, which they held.

The gunboat Quiros was then dispatched to Guam for aid, but on arrival there found the American flag outside the town limits." floating. The Quiros never returned, and at Yap, in the Caroline group, it was thought she was lost. The supposition is that the Ladrone

THE PLOT AGAINST WILHEL-

Berlin, Sept. 13.-Persistent rumors have been current here during the last few days that in spite of all statements to the contrary an attempt was made upon the life of Queen Wilhelmina about three weeks ago. One newspaper, which gives an account on the authority of Count Limburg-Stirrum, says that an Italian fired through from the woods, while the queen, with three ladies, was driving near her residence at Sost-Diek. Two shots went wild, but the third lodged in the arm of Countess Limburg-Stirrum.

The queen preserved her presence of mind, and ordered the affair kept a strict secret, owing to the approaching enthronement. The would-be assassin was arrested-so the story goes-and confessed himself an anarchist. Countess Limburg-Stirrum is recovering. An anarchist manifesto signed by the "revolutionary committee" has been distributed in Milan during the past few days. The police yesterday arrested an Italian who was distributing the manifesto. The prisoner, who had just arrived from Switzerland when he was seized, shouted "Long live anarchy!" "Death to the king!" Some of the crowd present at the time of the arrest interfered with the police officers who made the capture, and several persons were injured on both sides before the anarchist was lodged in the police depot. The newspapers at Rome

remark that the recent riots at Milan commenced in a similar manner. HARD WINTER IN AUSTRALIA. Dispatches by the steamer Miowera from Australia say that the weather is extremely cold there, and snowstorms are violent. Many travelers have been lost in the storms or frozen to death, while violent gales have been raging along the coas. A large number of wrecks have taken place.

ANTI-ITALIAN OUTBURST IN AUS-TRIA. London, Sept. 13.-Special dispatches from Vienna say the entire Austrian-Hungarian empire is infuriated against the Italians as a result of the assassination of the Empress Elizabeth and that violent anti-Italian demonstrations have taken place at Trieste, where the Italians and natives have been fighting in the streets with sticks and stones, sometimes using revolvers. Six deaths are reported to have occurred there, and troops were called out to suppress the disturbances.

At Gratz an Italian peddler has been lynched, and at Vienna fully 1,500 Italians employed on the municipal works have been summarily dismissed, in order to avert a popular revolt, and the Italian embassy there is guarded by strong body of infantry.

THE LATE EMPRESS. Geneva, Sept. 13.—The body of the late Empress of Austria has been inclosed in a triple coffin and placed in a room transformed into a mortuary chamber. The walls of this apartment are draped with black drapery, covered with silver stars, and several sisters of charity are continually on their knees beside the bier, praying for the soul of the departed. Near by stands the prayer table of the deceased, bearing her rosary and crucifix. The imposing demonstration of sympathy organized by the Federal Council commenced at noon on Monday. The procession, which took an hour in passing, defiled bareheaded before the hotel in spite of the hot sun. In the meanwhile the majority of the stores were closed.

THE CHAMBERLAIN INTERVIEW. London, Sept. 12.-The interest in the recently published interview with Colonial Secretary Chamberlain in New York, which was cabled here at length, continues to be great. There is much skepticism regarding its accuracy. The Chronicle cabled to Mr. Chamberlain regarding the authenticity of the interview, and he replied, stating that

no report was verbally accurate. He asked what particular statement in the interview was challenged. Chronicle replied that that part of the interview wherein he was reported to have called the czar a dreamer was doubted. Mr. Chamberlain replied that he had not said that the Anglo-German treaty had been signed. He had only said that he knew negotiations were in progress, and that he hoped they would lead to a better understanding.

THE CANDIA MASSACRES. London, Sept. 13.-The correspondent of the Times at Candia, Island of Crete, who has just landed, after five days in the roadstead, says: "About six hundred men, women and children were either burned alive or massacred in the outbreak last week. The Turkish troops are now patrolling and blocking up the streets. The Mussulmans are ransacking the ruins of the burned quarter of the town, where the devastation is complete. Euch bodies of the slain as were not burned were removed yesterday in carts and buried

METHODIST PARLIAMENT

Rules Discussed at the General Con ference and Changes Proposed.

Toronto, Sept. 12. - The most im-

portant matter before the general Methodist conference today was a resolution proposed by Dr. Jas. Mills, of Guelph, and seconded by M. S. F.
