The Carolines Lost

Natives Have Wrested Them From the Grasp of Spain.

Rival Kings Unite Their Forces and Defeat the Dons.

Story of the Attempt on Wilhelmina's Life Repeated.

One of the Shots Aimed at the Queen Wounded Her Companion.

About 600 Persons Perished in the Outbreak at Candia—The United States Will Not Accept Turkey's Repudiation of Responsibility for American Losses in Armenia.

The Caroline Islands, which belong to Spain, are undoubtedly by this time in the hands of the natives of the group, with the Spanish garrison wiped out. News of a revolution in the islands comes in letters from Honolulu by the steamer Coptic. The story was borne to Honolulu by a trading schooner.

Two native kings of the group, who had long been at war with each other, some months ago declared a truce, combined their forces and began a war against the Spanish authorities.

The Spaniards were concentrated at Ponape, and it was here the natives made their attack. The blacks fought with such vigor and in such numbers that the Spaniards were compelled to retreat and take shelter in the barracks, which they held.

The gunboat Quiros was then dispatched to Guam for aid, but on arrival there found the American flag hoisting in the harbor, and returned, and at Yap, in the Caroline group, it was thought she was lost.

The supposition is that the Ladrones garrison of Americans had possession of the islands, were 200 soldiers in Ponape town, but these were poorly supplied with ammunition, and in no position to resist a prolonged attack.

The belief is that the place was captured and the garrison slain. The entire group, unless the Spaniards made an unexpected stand, must be by this time in the possession of the natives.

THE PLOT AGAINST WILHELMINA.

Berlin, Sept. 13.—Persistent rumors have been current here during the last few days that in spite of all statements to the contrary an attempt was made upon the life of Queen Wilhelmina last week ago. One newspaper, which gives an account of the attempt, says that an Italian fired through from the woods, while the queen, with three ladies, was driving near her residence at Sost-Dieck. Two shots were wild, but the third lodged in the arm of Countess Limburg-Stirrum.

The queen preserved her presence of mind, and ordered the affair kept a strict secret, owing to the approaching enthronement. The would-be assassin was arrested—so the story goes—and confessed himself an anarchist. Countess Limburg-Stirrum is recovering.

An anarchist manifesto signed by the "revolutionary committee" has been distributed in Milan during the past few days. The police yesterday arrested an Italian who was distributing the manifesto. Two prisoners, who had just arrived from Switzerland when he was seized, shouted "Long live anarchy!" "Death to the king!" Some were present at the time of the arrest. There were several other persons who made the capture, and several were injured on both sides before the anarchist was lodged in the police depot. The newspapers at Rome remark that the recent riots which Milan commenced in a similar manner.

HARD WINTER IN AUSTRALIA.

Dispatches by the steamer Miowera from Australia say that the weather is extremely cold there, and snowstorms are violent. Many travelers have been lost in the storms, and frozen to death, while violent gales have been raging along the coasts. A large number of wrecks have taken place.

ANTI-ITALIAN OUTBURST IN AUSTRIA.

London, Sept. 13.—Special dispatches from Vienna say the entire Austro-Hungarian empire is infuriated against the Italians as a result of the assassination of the Empress Elizabeth and that violent anti-Italian demonstrations have taken place at Trieste, where the Italians and natives have been fighting in the streets with stones and stones, sometimes using revolvers. Six deaths are reported to have occurred there, and troops were called out to suppress the disturbances.

At Graz in Italian peddler has been lynched, and at Vienna fully 1,500 Italian employees on the municipal works have been summarily dismissed, in order to avert a popular revolt, and the Italian embassy there is guarded by a strong body of infantry.

THE LATE EMPRESS.

Geneva, Sept. 13.—The body of the late Empress of Austria has been inclosed in a triple coffin and placed in a room transformed into a mortuary chamber. The walls of this apartment were draped with black drapery, covered with silver tapers, and several sisters of charity are continually on their knees beside the bier, praying for the soul of the departed. Near by stands the prayer table of the deceased, bearing her rosary and crucifix. The imposing demonstration of sympathy organized by the Federal Council commenced at noon on Monday. The procession, which took an hour in passing, defiled bareheaded before the hotel in spite of the hot sun. In the meanwhile the majority of the streets were closed.

A CRISIS THREATENED IN FRANCE.

Paris, Sept. 13.—The Rappel and the Matin today say that at yesterday's cabinet council the minister of war explained his reason for opposing a re-

vision of the Dreyfus case. The newspapers here are unanimous in expressing the opinion that the situation is serious. They say that temporizing will only delay the decision, which is favorable to a revision of the case, will cause the resignation of Gen. Zurlinden, and which, if hostile, will lead to a withdrawal from the cabinet of M. Brisson and will result in a general crisis.

It is officially announced that Col. De Pratay de Cham has been placed on the inactive list and dismissed from his post in consequence of the general staff's investigation into the Esterhazy case. President Faure retired Col. De Pratay de Cham at the suggestion of the minister of war, Gen. Zurlinden.

THE CHAMBERLAIN INTERVIEW.

London, Sept. 12.—The interest in the recently published interview with Colonial Secretary Chamberlain in New York, which was cabled here at length, continues to be great. There is much skepticism regarding its accuracy. The Chronicle cabled to Mr. Chamberlain regarding the authenticity of the interview, and he replied, stating that no report was verbally accurate. He asked what particular statement in the interview was challenged. The Chronicle replied that that part of the interview wherein he was reported to have called the czar a dreamer was doubted. Mr. Chamberlain replied that he had not said that the Anglo-German treaty had been signed. He had only said that he knew negotiations were in progress, and that he hoped they would lead to a better understanding.

THE CANDIA MASSACRE.

London, Sept. 13.—The correspondent of the Times at Candia, island of Crete, who has just landed, after five days in the island, says: "About six hundred men, women and children were either burned alive or massacred in the outbreak last week. The Turkish troops are now patrolling and blocking up the streets. The Mussulmans are ransacking the ruins of the burned quarter of the town, where the devastation is complete. Such bodies of the slain as were not buried were removed yesterday in carts and buried outside the town limits."

Constantinople, Sept. 13.—The United States, it is announced, has replied to a recent note of the Turkish Government, declining to accept Turkey's repudiation of the responsibility for Armenian losses during the Armenian trouble.

CABLE NOTES.

It is said to be probable that General Kitchener will be given a grant of \$25,000, and be made a viscount, as a preliminary to elevating him to the peerage, where he is expected to take the title of Lord Kitchener of Khartoum.

The Queen has restored to his rank in the British army Col. Frank Rhodes, brother of Cecil Rhodes, who was dismissed for participation in the Jameson raid in December, 1895. Colonel Rhodes was wounded at the battle of Omdurman, while acting as war correspondent for the London Times.

Much greater faith is placed in the pending negotiations between London and St. Petersburg, which presage a friendly agreement in regard to China than in the czar's millennium.

It is expected that Mr. Chamberlain, before returning home, will pay a visit to Ottawa.

In regard to the czar's conference, a member of the Russian embassy at Berlin says he does not expect an early conference, and he admits the possibility of one or more of the powers refusing to join, in which case it would be dropped.

The Madrid correspondent of the London Standard says: "The attempts of General Polavieja and Senor Canalejas to form a third party have only resulted in an increased cohesion of the great dynastic parties."

Victoria is again active. An immense sensation has been created all over Australia by the discovery in Western Australia of a huge nugget of gold valued at \$32,000. Its weight is authentically certified as 115 pounds avoirdupois.

From Penhurst, Victoria, comes the news of a daring bank robbery. An armed man held up a local branch of the Bank of Victoria, bound and gagged the manager, and placed \$200 in notes and gold from the strong room and decamped. The robber was arrested later. His name is James Ryan.

METHODIST PARLIAMENT

Rules Discussed at the General Conference and Changes Proposed.

Toronto, Sept. 12.—The most important matter before the general Methodist conference today was a resolution proposed by Dr. Jas. Mills, of Guelph, and seconded by M. S. F. Lazier, Q.C., of Hamilton, to eliminate the following note to the rules of discipline, which was adopted in 1886 by the general conference: "The general rules are to be understood as forbidding neglect of duties of any kind, imprudent conduct, indulging in sinful tempers or words; the buying, selling or using of intoxicating liquors as a beverage; dancing, playing at games of chance, encouraging lotteries, attending theaters, horse races, circuses, dancing parties, patronizing dancing schools, taking part in such amusements as are obviously of a misleading or questionable moral tendency, and all acts of disobedience to the order and discipline of the church, and to substitute the following: "The foregoing rules shall be understood as enjoining upon members of the church whatever is required in the Holy Scriptures, and forbidding whatever is contrary to the letter or spirit thereof."

This resolution of Dr. Mills had first been presented to conference in the shape of a memorial, and had been referred to the discipline committee. The discipline committee reported this afternoon and forbidding whatever is contrary to the letter or spirit thereof."

The debate was very generally taken part in and adjourned until tomorrow. Most of the prominent laymen and many of the leading clergymen favored the resolution,
