TORRENT OF BOMBS DROPPED ON BASES OF FOE'S U-BOATS

Many Tons of Explosives Thrown By British Aircraft Into Ostend, Zeebrugge and Bruges

London, June 1, 5 p.m. - Many tons of bombs have been dropped by British aircraft on the Belgian towns of Ostend, Zeebrugge and Bruges, says an official statement issued this afternoon by the British war department.

BERLIN REPORTS IT.

Berlin, June 1 .- Via London .- Heavy gun firing last night reached a stage of great intensity in the region of the dunes on the Belgian coast and in the Ypres bend, particularly in the Wytschaete sector, says the official statement issued today by the German army headquarters staff.

The text of the official British announcement says: "Several raids were carried out by naval aircraft from Dunkirk in the course flast night, the objectives being Ostend, Zeebrugge and Bruges.
"Many tons of bombs were dropped on the objectives, with good results. In every case all our machines returned safely.
