AND KEEPERS FINED

Lee Waugh Has To Pay \$100 To Court.

TWO TINS WERE FOUND

Together With Pipes and Other Portions of Smoking Outfit.

Convicted of keeping an opium joint at 222 King street, Lee Waugh's Chinaman, was today fined \$100 costs in the Police Court. The result of a raid made last night by Detective Albert Egerton and Harry Dowd, of the Police Department.

Following the arrest of Waugh, Detective Egerton and Dowd found two tins of opium, two opium pipes and a quantity of other paraphernalia used by those who "hit the pipe." One tin of opium was found in a room on the second floor. The other was hidden on a shelf. The two pipes were of the cheap bamboo ones with nickel mountings.

Waugh denied that he had any opium, and that he was not a dealer in the drug. He was fined \$100 and costs, and given a 30-day probation. He was also ordered to pay for the cost of the raid.

Long Reported Missing,  
Now Believed To Be Dead

Pte. R. H. S. Herwood Officially Declared to Have Been Killed.

Pte. R. H. S. Herwood, 332 Ridout street, is believed to be dead, according to official reports received from Ottawa. He was reported missing on August 16, 1918.

When he enlisted on the 25th of May, 1917, his chum, George Farquhar, a former resident of Detroit, enlisted with him, and they were not parted till in France on the 16th of August, 1917. When they were taking the town of Fresnoy Le Vov, as they were both knights, they were detailed for scouting duty and were parted. That was the last time that Pte. Farquhar saw his chum.

He waited till the 20th of August, and then Pte. Herwood did not turn up. He wrote to Mr. and Mrs. Herwood a detailed account of the whole affair. That was the last heard in regard to the missing till the official report last week stating that he is believed to be dead. Pte. Herwood was a former employee of R. C. Struthers & Co.

Committee Will Recommend This and Ask Municipal Council to Deal With Springbank Question.
