Mr. Duff (Lunenburg) said the clause was not adequate for taking the vote of sailors, and if sailors could not be put on equal terms with commercial travelers, he advocated abolishing the advance poll altogether. Dr. Manion (Fort William) said the advance poll had been of great value in his constituency in the last election and satisfactory to the electors themselves. The clause was finally allowed to stand, but No. 101, the last one in the bill, which makes the bill apply to elections under the Canadian temperance act, so far as it can be made applicable, was carried.

A number of schedules of forms attached to the bill, which are to be used at elections, were passed.

Levi Thomson (Qu'Appelle) said the apparent intention of requiring incorporation was to insure publicity, and to that end he proposed that any association organized for political purposes should file a memorandum of its places of business and its officers, and that particulars of their contributions for election purposes should be filed with the chief electoral officer, and be compelled to publish such contributions in the newspapers or elsewhere.

Mr. McMaster (Brome). who said that Parliament had been lowered in the eyes of the public owing to the belief that members were elected by funds supplied by their friends, and that the big interests had a hand in their election, introduced an amendment which would forbid any incorporated or unincorporated company or firm contributing to campaign funds. Subscriptions by individuals should be permitted, but with requirement of the fullest possible publicity.

Mr. Gould (Assiniboia) said the people in the West were sick of machine politics. They felt that the big interests were behind the governments. He described the action of the electors of the western provinces in subscribing small amounts—50 cents to \$1—to support their candidates as purity in politics, which drew derisive laughter from the Government benches.

John Best (Dufferin) deprecated the practice of a house-to-house canvass a year or two ahead of election time. In the West, he understood, organizers were going from farm to farm, asking the people for money when they did not know yet who would be the candidates. He had heard that Mr. Gould's election had cost \$4,000 for printing alone. The member for Assiniboia had declared that brains and not money were necessary to get a candidate elected. Four thousand dollars for rinting would mean a total bill of \$12,000—to elect a man with brains. It had not cost him (Best) one-twelfth of that amount. He would prohibit all contributions if he prohibited any.

Restrict Amount.

Mr. Sexsmith (Peterboro) would do away with all campaign contributions

and restrict the amount which might be spent on an election in any constituency. As a farmer he was ashamed of the methods of farmers' organizations in politics.

Mr. Gould defended the system of small contributions. It stimulated interest in the cause. The allegation about a \$12,000 election was ridiculous. His own organization had collected just \$5,667, and much of it was still in the treasury.

Mr. Best said he had based his \$12.000 estimate on the printing bill of \$4,000, and Mr. Gould denied that he had ever stated that this amount was spent on printing.


