## CAN'T MAKE UP MINDS ON TECHNICAL SCHOOL

Board of Education Must Decide for Themselves as to Proper Site.

Unable to agree in any particular, the special committee of the board of education dealing with the matter of a technical school site, decided yesterday to let the board fight it out at the next meeting. The committee had spent considerable time in visiting all the new offerings and after a lengthy discussion, focused their attention on three propositions, namely, the present site in Rosedale, the St. Albans site and the Borden-street property. Mr. Rawlinson moved the St. Albans site and the vote was a tie. Dr. Hawke broached the Borden-street property, and there was another deadlock. The same thing occurred with Mr. Brown's proposal of retaining the present site. Mr. Houston said nothing could be gained by further argument, and the matter was referred to the board as it stood. Those present were: Dr. Ogden (chairman), Trustees Brown, H. Simpson, Houston, Hawke, Rawlinson. The finance committee recommended that the regular amount of superannuation for the balance of the year be paid to the widow of the late J. Miller, mathematical master in Jameson-avenue Collegiate.

## ALMOST PERFECT ECLIPSE.

Many Astronomers Attracted to Washington Observatory.

WASHINGTON, June 28.—The eclipse of the sun served to attract astronomers and spectators to the United States Naval Observatory here yesterday, where that event was observed with keen interest. The day was very favorable for the purpose, and thru the courtesy of Capt. W. J. Barnard, U. S. N., superintendent of the observatory, a large number of persons gathered to observe the phenomenon.

The image of the sun was almost perfect when the first contact occurred, but it was not so good at the time of the second contact owing to clouds. There were five scientists taking observations with the different observatory instruments.

WATERTOWN, N.Y., June 28.—The steamer Arundell, which ran on a shoal near Thousand Island Park, St. Lawrence River, June 19, was hoisted for day and towed to Kingston, Ont., for repairs. The vessel was only slightly damaged, and is expected to resume her route between Charlotte and the Thousand Islands this week.

TEACHERS FROM PACIFIC PROVINCES CANNOT GO Cost of the Journey Across the Continent to Montreal is Too Great.

VANCOUVER, June 27.—(Special.)—It is improbable that British Columbia will be represented by a very large delegation of teachers in the contingent which will take advantage of the Mosley tour of England this summer. So far, it is understood that two have sent in their names and there is not a general rush of others to avail themselves of the cheap rate of \$25, which, thru the generosity of the British member of parliament, has been arranged for 300 delegates from the Dominion.

The trouble is the cost of the fare between here and Montreal. Unless some greatly reduced rate is extended to the teachers of the province for the trip between here and Montreal, the girls will prove an insurmountable obstacle.
