**OWN'S 134 THOROBREDS**  
Irving H. Wheatcroft of Vancouver Plans for Season's Racing.

VANCOUVER, March 9.—Irving H. Wheatcroft, who has the largest thorobred establishment of any Canadian owner, has just returned from a tour of the Southern States, in the course of which he visited his Kentucky ranch. He left some days ago for his home at St. James, Ireland.

In the course of an interview regarding Mr. Wheatcroft's plans for the forthcoming season his secretary said: "Mr. Wheatcroft now owns 134 thorobreds. They are the stallions Cossack and Yorkshire Lad, sixty-five brood mares and forty-four yearlings at the farm in Woodford County, twenty-two horses in training at Los Angeles, two mares at the farm on St. James, Ireland, and one two-year-old yearling in the barn of John Rodegop at the Kentucky Association track. The prospects are that he has four of the year's first of which is four this month, will number fifty-five. By the way, I met him when I was at the farm to see that Katie W. (dam of Flying Squirrel) is not in foal, as we supposed. This makes one less than we were figuring on."

"Mr. Wheatcroft, since things have gone away in the long winter, has decided to sell off the inferior ones now in the stable at Los Angeles and ship a carload of them to Kentucky in time for the meeting at Louisville. Stenwider and French Cook are eligible to the Kentucky Derby, and Elizabeth Harwood will in all probability go in the Kentucky Oaks, she has got to give her owner more satisfactory evidence that she will race well at a route over a mile. She has been twice asked to go seven furlongs at Santa Anita, and both times failed. Trainer Marston, however, says it was due to the condition of the track rather than to any infirmity on the part of the filly to run the distance. Elizabeth Harwood is not a mud runner, she has no fancy for any going other than the driest and fastest."

"After the Louisville meeting, Mr. Wheatcroft plans to send the stable into Canada to race out the remainder of the year. It may be, too, that he will spend some of the time at the New York tracks. This will depend upon what is offered in the way of stakes and the condition of the horses at the time."

**TORONTO FRANCHISE NOT SOLD.**  
The report in an evening paper that the Toronto Lacrosse Club franchise had been sold to the promoters of the new east and west park was news to Fred Thompson of the Toronto, who interviewed last night.

Mr. Thompson stated that they had a pretty fair team, and with some strengthening up, would make a strong bid for the championship. Thus, on the face of this, they would be foolish to sell the franchise at a time when it was bound to be a money-maker.

It was also news to one of Mr. Thompson's two partners, who, along with Mr. Thompson, assured The World that the franchise was not for sale, and that they had made an offer for the franchise.

So far as playing at Rosedale is concerned, the Toronto Club are from Missouri, and the park promoters have to show them that playing in the east will prove a money-maker. This playing in the east end is an old yarn, however, but so far as the franchise being sold is concerned, the foregoing will tell you what the story is worth.
