

HAMILTON HAPPENINGS

WOMAN, STRUCK BY RIG, IS SERIOUSLY INJURED

Mrs. Cruickshank Taken to Hospital—Four Policemen Dismissed—Scarcity of Teachers.

HAMILTON, Aug. 16.—(Special)—Mrs. Cruickshank, corner of Sherman and Main-streets, was run over by a rig opposite the city hall this afternoon. She suffered a broken leg and other injuries. She was taken to St. Joseph's Hospital and is in a very serious condition.

Street Railway Earnings.—The city's percentage of the street railway earnings for the quarter ended June 30 shows the largest increase in earnings ever recorded for that quarter. The company's total receipts from April to June, inclusive, amounted to \$31,746.31, and the cheque to the city called for the payment of \$22,116.

Security of Rigs.—Mrs. Cruickshank was struck by a rig, which was under false pretences was the charge that Mary Ling, 155 King William-street, laid against A. Q. D. McDonald, 58 South Catharine-street. Mrs. Ling stated that McDonald had secured 54 weeks' board from her and had paid only \$23. He will be given the maximum penalty.

Four Policemen Dismissed.—Four policemen were dismissed by the police commissioners to-day. Those let out were Constables Leonard, Argo, Grant and Brockbank. The latter is missing from home. Leonard was the officer who claimed he was assaulted at the corner of Bold and Caroline-streets one night and Argo simply quit. Grant had been suspended by Chief Smith for failing to visit some houses, and the commission discharged him. All had been on the force only a few months.

Some of the public schools of the county opened for the fall term yesterday, but those in the immediate neighborhood of the city will not open until Sept. 1. In some of the rural schools of the province a dilemma is facing the trustees because of their desire to keep down the salary as low as possible, and the result is that they are without teachers for the opening of the schools. In the adjoining County of Lincoln there are eight schools without teachers, and in Wentworth there are two schools which lack the full number of teachers.

There is a case of smallpox in the city, the victim being a woman who contracted the disease in Brantford and came to this city. She is living alone in a certain house and the medical health officer says no alarm need be felt.
