The death-rate has been 8.0, or, excluding the 80 cases in which death occurred within three days after admission, 4.3, against 5.0 last year.

Of 196 deaths 9 were due to appendicitis, 18 to pneumonia, 10 to tubercular meningitis, 11 to typhoid fever, 23 to diphtheria, 23 to scarlet fever, 2 to fracture of the skull.

There were 498 major operations in the indoor surgical department and 1,010 minor operations in the outdoor surgical department. In the special department for the diseases peculiar to women there were 122 operations performed, with four deaths, two of these came in in a moribund condition and one died of cancer.

There were 30,680 consultations in the General Out-door Department, an average of about 100 per day, 20,246 of these were Roman Catholics, 10,126 were Protestants, 300 were of various religions.

The ambulance responded to 617 calls, of which the expense had to be largely borne by the Hospital.

The following Life-Governors have died during the year : John J. Arnton, James Burnett, William A. Clarkson, Dr. George E. Fenwick, Captain J. D. Molson, W. H. Meredith, Duncan McIntyre, John C. Watson, and an elected governor, J. Murray Smith. Of these Dr. Fenwick served the Hospital for almost thirty years as a valued member of the Medical Board. He was an active member of the surgical staff of the Hospital from 1865 to 1890, when failing health induced him to retire from regular duty.
