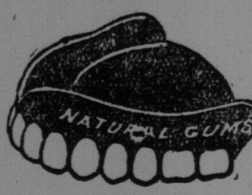

DRIVES ON STREAMS ARE ALL OUT NOW

Encouraging Reports from the Miramichi—Water in the St. John River is Falling.

(Fredericton Gleaser.) While nothing very definite can be learned as yet regarding the drives at the head of the Upper St. John river word comes from the Miramichi that the drives on the streams are all out.

A despatch today from Blackville states that the men are going home today, it being the last of the stream drives. The corporation drive will come along later.

Boiestown reports a good run of logs yesterday and encouraging reports from the drives, the water falling somewhat since yesterday.

The water in the river here has fallen a couple of inches since yesterday Edmundston and Woodstock this morning reported a few new logs running and that the water had fallen a few inches during the night.

The Little River drives are all out, there being about 3 1/2 millions of new stuff and about a million old logs. The Newcastle drive in Queens county consisting of about 1 1/2 millions is also in safe waters.
