**LAUNCH.**—On Wednesday last a fine ship was launched in beautiful style from Mr. George Thomson's Yard in Portland; she is called the "Zamboni"—will register nearly 700 tons, and being built with prime materials, has the appearance of being a first rate vessel, combining, in a great degree, all the requisites to ensure speed, safety, and accommodation.

**ENCOURAGING.**—The ship *James Stewart*, of this port, returned from a Whaling Voyage on Thursday last, with a full cargo, consisting of 1970 barrels Black Oil, and 530 of Sp. Cam, and 29,000 lbs of Whale Bone. She has been absent only nineteen months, and her crew are in good health and spirits.

**LOSS OF THE BRIT BRITANNIA.**—A more particular account of the loss of this vessel than the one heretofore published, has reached us this morning, and will be found in our Marine list. Among the sufferers on that melancholy occasion, we regret to find the names of Captain Walker and Mr. Woodward, (master); they were natives of Nova-Scotia, and have left many friends and relations in both Provinces to deplore the awfully sudden catastrophe.

The following are the concluding remarks of a writer in a late number of the *Quebec Gazette*: they are so peculiarly applicable at this time, that I think they cannot be too generally disseminated.

It has been observed that the virulence and mortality of the cholera, where it has prevailed, has always been great in proportion to the fulminancy of the town, and the irregular and incautious habits of the people. Paris suffered more than London, New York more than Boston or Philadelphia, and New York much less than Montreal and Quebec and many of our most healthy inland parishes.

I trust then that our authorities will see that the streets, public places, and houses, &c. are freed from all filth and nuisance before the melting of the snow. They will surely be supported by the inhabitants in this measure, as well as by the efforts of every household and individual to promote cleanliness, both of the dwelling, the food and the person.

The quarters of the town and the houses most afflicted last year, demand particular attention. It was very generally observed that the severity of the disease was more prevalent in the same quarters and even in the same houses as in 1832.

The efforts that were made in the spring of 1833, probably saved the town from the visitation of the disease on the setting in of the season in the following year. Similar efforts this year can cost but little, and are certain of producing a good effect,—that of cleanliness and comfort to the inhabitants, and less danger to strangers.

It will be too late to expect much good effect if the whole filth of the winter is suffered to remain in the apartments, clothing and effects, or to putrify and settle down about the houses and in the yards and streets, and then exhale, as the power of the sun and heat increase, and the bodies of men become prepared to receive disease.

On Thursday evening, pursuant to notice, the Annual Meeting of the *Portland Temperance Society*, was held in the Episcopal Church, the President of the Society, the Hon. the Speaker of the House of Assembly, in the chair.—Although the weather was uncommonly wet, the meeting was respectable and numerously attended. Several motions were unanimously adopted, the movers of which manifested much zeal, and ability in advocating the claims of the temperance cause. At the close of the meeting a number of names were added to the Society's list.—*Temperance Advocate.*

We are still without later advices from England.—A few items, however, are extracted from our American and Canadian files.

Sir George Murray, the new Master General of the Ordnance, will not, it is said, resign his seat in the Cabinet, owing to the result of the Perthshire election.

It is rumoured that the Knight of Kerry is to be raised to the Peerage.

The new Lord Lieutenant of Ireland has expressed his determination, that every article in his establishment, capable of being produced in the country, shall be of Irish manufacture.

The proceedings against Archdeacon Hyler, Captain Collyer, and Captain Bayly, in relation to the Rotherham title affair, have been removed, by certiorari, to the Court of King's Bench, Dublin.

On Sunday morning, as the Rev. Dr. Sutton, one of the Prebends of Westminster, was officiating at the altar, reading the ninth Commandment, he suddenly dropped down in a fit of apoplexy, and was carried by his residence in the cloisters, where he expired at eleven o'clock on the following morning.

We notice by a London paper of the 28th January, that Mr. W. Ewart Gladstone transacted business on the previous day, at the Colonial Office, as one of the Under Secretaries of that Department. We presume that he is the successor of Mr. Stuart Wortley, and that the former report of Lord Sandon's appointment is incorrect.—*Montreal Gazette.*

**STEAM NAVIGATION TO INDIA.**—The importance of a Steam Navigation to India by the Mediterranean and the Red Sea, is daily impressing itself upon the mind of every British statesman, and not less so the merchant and manufacturer. The mighty empire founded in the East by British wisdom and British valor, during the reigns of the illustrious Georges, must ever be dear to the British people; and every enterprise that has for its object the permanency of their rule, and the happiness and prosperity of their distant fellow subjects in that region, must command their attention and applause. Frequency and facility of intercourse will be a powerful agent in introducing British arts and civilization among the Hindoo, and in proportion as these people become enlightened, and imbibe a love of liberty, so in proportion will they become the friends and admirers of England. A love for British laws and liberty, will introduce British customs and British wants, and at no distant period India will be one of the first vents, not only for the manufactures of Manchester, Birmingham, Sheffield, but also for the higher product of science and literature. But it is not in India alone that we may look for the accomplishment of such great events. The successful progress made by that enlightened individual, the Pacha of Egypt,

in promoting civilization amongst the barbarous hordes which he has subjected, is another great step towards the general introduction of the articles of British industry. The proposed route to India lies through the dominions of this extraordinary Chief, and a constant communication with and transit through them, cannot fail to work the same results in Egypt as we anticipated in India. The success of Ibrahim Pacha in his war against the Sultan, will doubtless, sooner or later, aid Syria permanently in his father's conquests. Egypt, Arabia, and Syria then, when fairly reduced to habits and good order, will form a magnificent empire, and the influence of an enlightened government, may in time restore in some degree, the lost greatness of that once imperial region. What a field does this present for British skill and industry!—*N. Y. Observer.*

**QUEBEC, March 18.**—The session of the Provincial Parliament was closed this day at two o'clock.—The Felo's Counsel Bill, the only one passed by both Houses, was reserved for the Royal sanction.—The following is a copy of Lord Aylmer's Speech on the occasion.

"Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, "It appears by the Customary official reports transmitted to me daily by the Clerk of the House of Assembly, that some delay has taken place in the assembling of a sufficient number of Members to constitute a quorum for business; and as it may be inferred from some recent proceedings of the Assembly, that no further business will be transacted in this branch of Provincial Parliament, I can no longer feel justified, notwithstanding my great anxiety to prolong the present Session, in detaining from their homes and usual occupations, those Members of the two Houses, who are in the Parliament who may be disposed to persevere in the performance of their Legislative duties.

"Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, "I have upon this occasion only to express my regret, that the present Session should have failed in producing those measures of freedom and relief, the financial difficulties of the Province, which are so urgently required under existing circumstances.

"It would have afforded me much gratification, had I been able to report to His Majesty's Government, that the responsibility so generously incurred, with the view of relieving in some measure the urgent wants of the Public Service, had proved to be successful, and that the payment from one of the Public Funds of the Province, of the advance of Thirty-one Thousand Pounds Sterling, made in pursuance of the Instructions of the late Secretary of State for the Colonial Department, from the Military chest.

"Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, "I informed you at the opening of the present Session that I was then in possession of important Communications, and that I expected to receive others from His Majesty's Government, upon subjects of vital importance to the interests of the Province. The Communications which were advertised to on that occasion, as having been received, have been since laid before you, but I have not yet received those which I then informed you I expected to receive, and which I have every reason to believe must now be passed at hand. That the expected Despatches will bear an extraordinary degree of importance to the general interests of the Province, and will require that communications should take place in relation to their contents, between the head of the Executive Government, and the two Houses of Provincial Parliament, can hardly admit of a doubt being entertained, when it is considered that the Committee of the House of Commons to whom were referred in the last Session of the Imperial Parliament, certain matters relating to the affairs of this Province, including the Petition of the House of Assembly, dated 1st of March, 1834, recommended with reference to the unhappy differences existing between the two branches of the Colonial Legislature, as well as between the House of Assembly and His Majesty's Government, that the practical measures for the future administration of Lower Canada, should be left to the mature consideration of the Government, responsible for their adoption and execution.

"Under these circumstances the premature termination of the Session, which is now unavoidable as an event deeply to be regretted."

**QUEBEC, March 20.**—We understand that Captain MERRISON, A. D. C. to His Excellency the Governor in Chief, sets out this evening for England, as bearer of Despatches to the Colonial Office.

Henry Joseph Esq. the Collector of H. B. Customs, imprisoned by the Assembly, was retained in the common jail to the close of the Session, on Wednesday afternoon.

The former Quantine establishment is to be continued during the present season. Captain Reid, of the 22nd, will continue as Superintendent and, notwithstanding the regiment moves to Montreal.

In consequence of the unfinished state of much of the business before Congress when the late session terminated, some of the American papers speak of a meeting of Congress before the time fixed by law.

**THE WEATHER.**—Last Sunday we were visited with a storm such as we were wont to have ten or a dozen years ago, which after venting its fury upon us, for the space of 18 or 20 hours, left us with quantities of sleet and rain, and the saying of "six weeks' sleet" in March. Our streets presented on Monday morning, quite a formidable array of banks;—they are mostly broken now, however, and a number of our citizens were engaged on Monday, in removing the deposits from their doors and windows.—The weather cold as January.—*Eastport Sentinel, March 25.*

**GREAT SALES.**—We understand that the plot of ground now occupied by Mr. Thoburn, in Liberty street, near Broadway, is a sea seed store, has been sold for \$50,000. It is situated on a city street is nearly 100 feet, and about 100 feet deep. About 12 years since, Mr. Thoburn bought this property for less than \$50,000. It will be recalled that Mr. T's seed store was formerly the meeting house of the ancient and respectable Society of Friends.

Christ Church in Ann street, recently owned by the Catholics, has been sold for \$30,000, and was as yet to be feverishly tried. A few years since, this property was sold by the Rev. Mr. Sellen the owner, and an Episcopal minister, for \$18,000.—*N. Y. Gazette.*

Extract of a letter from one of the passengers on board the New York packet ship *Caledonia*, to his friend Mr. Woodcock, in the *Caledonia*, on her passage from New York to Liverpool, on the 6th January, at 28 N. long. 62, 20 W. saw a wreck at some distance to leeward, when Capt. Graham immediately put the ship about and bore down for it.—It proved to be the brigantine *Britannia*, of St. John, N. B.—a heavy sea, then running, could not board her for some time; as soon as it subsided, sent a boat alongside, and found four men on board, who gave the following particulars of the wreck.—Sailed from St. John for Berberic on Sunday, 21st December, and at midnight on the following Sunday, when lying to under a storm tressel, the vessel was struck with a heavy sea, which, assisted by the heavy deck load, capsized her,—cut away the foremast, when the vessel righted, carrying away the mainmast, bowsprit, rudder, and jib boom: the second day after the accident, caught a shark, whose blood served the survivors for drink; upon this and a barrel of potatoes they subsisted until relieved, which was the eighth day—two of them were unable to get up the side of the *Caledonia*, without assistance.—The master, Mr. T. Walker, Mr. W. Woodcock, Mr. Elliott, 21 mate; and the cook, (George Moore), a colored man, being in the cabin at the time when the vessel capsized, were drowned. The names of the men saved are, James Potter, William Phillips, Thomas, of St. John, a colored man."
