Board of Trade Council Takes up

Board of Trade Council Takes up

This Matter—Report on West
Side Work

At a meeting of the council of the
Board of Trade this morning the traffic
committee recommended that a larger
steamer be put on the St. John-Yarmouth route to perform the service carried on by the John L. Cann and the
Westport III. The latter was recently
withdrawn from the service altogether.
The committee wants to see on the
route a cteamer of 1,500 tons capacity
and a speed of eleven knots. They have
been in communication with Messrs.
Cann and the latter have expressed willingness to meet the committee's wishes
if the subsidy be increased sufficiently.
The Board of Trade approves of the
larger steamer being secured as the J.
L. Cann is not large enough and cannot
carry all the freight that is offering.
The harbor committe, which visited
the West Side terminals yesterday, reported that they found about 150,000
yards of material dumped so far. The
contract calls for 475,000, and the contractor expressed confidence that the
filling would all be in by Sept. 1, and the
warehouse on Pier 16 ready by the end
of September.

WORLD'S LIGHTWEIGHT

BELTS CIRCLE CAR'S TIRES AND PREVEN' SKIDDING

To increase the traction of a motor car's driving wheels when sand or rough roads are encountered, and also to prevent skidding on wet pavements, a Washington state man has divised a tire belt which is apparently effective. It is described in the September Popular Mechanics Magazine. It is made of a heavy fabric and passed around a tire and over a small pulley mounted to the under side of the running board. Belts are applied to each of the rear wheels and save the wear and tear on the tires, almost doubling, it is said, their mileage and materially decreasing fuel consumption on heavy roads.
