There are probably some men about St. John or the province who have been holding back from the colors in the fear that their teeth, on examination, would prevent their being accepted for service. Such men today need have no fear. The lack of a few molars will not prohibit their donning the king's uniform, for the scope of the Army Dental Corps is to be extended and a recruit, otherwise sound, need not worry as to the possibility of being refused, whether he has poor teeth, good teeth, or in fact no teeth at all.

It was said today by Doctor S. Skinner, medical examining officer in the local recruiting offices, that few rejections had been made here because of bad teeth. He had had as yet no orders from headquarters, however, instructing him that lack of masticating machinery would not be a bar to acceptance of a volunteer. The reason for the almost entire abandonment of dental examination, however, with recruits in Canada is that major dentistry is to be practised in future in the training camps, and Valcartier is to be the scene of much activity along this line.

In the early stages of recruiting many otherwise good men were rejected because they had bad teeth, too generous a quantity of porcelain molars, or too small a supply of real ones. The officers of the Dental Corps are to be instructed to go beyond the ordinary scope which has thus far occupied their time, in fillings and extractions, and will even supply such souvenirs of dental architecture as army plates and sets of army teeth to enable the men to properly masticate the soldier's rations.
