LACK OF TEETH NOW NO BAR TO RECRUITS.
Work of Dental Corps Extended to Enable Them to Remedy Defects Which Formerly Kept Some Good Men Out of Rank.

There are probably some men about St. John or the province who have been holding back from the colors in the fear that their teeth, on examination, would prevent their being accepted for service. Such men today need have no fear. The lack of a few molars will not prohibit their donning the king's uniform, for the scope of the Army Dental Corps is to be extended and to remedy, or to sound, need not worry as to the possi-bility of being refused, whether he has soon teeth, good teeth, or fact no teeth at all.

It was said today by Doctor S. Skinner, medical examining officer in the local recruiting offices, that few re-jections had been made here because of bad teeth. He had had as yet no ap-plicants from headquarters, however, in-structing him that lack of masticating machinery would not be a bar to acceptance as a vol-unteer. The reason for the almost en-tire abandonment of dental examination, however, with recruits in Canada is that major dentistry is to be practised in fu-ture in the training camps, and Valen-tier is to be the scene of much ac-tivity along this line.

In the early stages of recruiting many otherwise good men were rejected be-cause they had bad teeth, too generous a quantity of perfect molars, or too small a supply of real ones. The officers of the Dental Corps are to be instructed to go beyond the ordinary scope which has thus far occupied their time, in fillings and extractions, and will even supply such novelties of dental archi-tecture as army plates and sets of army teeth to enable the men to properly masticate the soldier's rations.

DR. MACFARLAND WILL RETURN TO FAIRVILLE
Dr. Macfarland, who has been residing in Clifton, Kings county, expects to return to Fairville soon and there re-sume his practice. For several years Dr. Macfarland's health has not been satis-factory and last fall he went to Clifton to recuperate. Fortunately the change has proved beneficial and he is now fully recovered. As soon as he can obtain suitable quarters he will again take up his residence in Fairville. During the many years of his practice in that dis-trict he won an enviable reputation both as a physician and a citizen and his re-turn will be welcomed heartily.

Court Confirms Agreement Made on Dissolution of Donohue Brothers Partnership

Chief Justice McLeod granted an injunction this morning in the case of William Donohue vs. Henry Donohue, restraining the defendant from driving a coach or entering into a hack or livery stable business for the period of two years. The application was made by W. J. Mahoney in behalf of the plain-tiff, and the defendant put in no ap-pearing in a hack or livery stable busi-ness or drive a coach for two years, and the other brother for three years.
