SICILIAN HALTED BY BRITISH SHOT ACROSS BOW

London, June 18—Passengers on the Allan liner Sicilian, which docked here yesterday, say that when off the Thames estuary, the Sicilian was ordered to stop by a British patrol boat. In consequence of a misunderstanding, she continued on her course. The patrol fired two blank shots and a British gunnery officer fired a blank shot, and then sent a shot across the Sicilian's bows. The liner hurriedly stopped and after a visit by a naval officer was allowed to proceed. There was a Thames pilot on board, and the Sicilian was flying proper signals.

JUDGMENT GIVEN IN THE MAY QUEEN CASE

Judgment was given this morning by Justice McCreary in the King's Bench Division in a case of unusual interest, not only on account of some peculiar features involved, but also because of the length of time it has been before the courts. The case arose from the winding up of the affairs of the May Queen Steamship Company, Ltd., and was based on the claim of Fred H. Colwell for \$2,000 under a mortgage on the steamer, held by him. Clarence H. Ferguson was appointed curator about a year ago and at the time held up the payment due on the mortgage on account of counter-claims which the company had against Mr. Colwell, who was the manager of the company in 1913.

It is expected that all the city cadets will attend the Imperial tomorrow night.

SWEDEN PROTESTS THAT BRITAIN HELD UP MAILS

Washington, June 18—The first official protest growing out of the interference with the mails in the war, was forwarded to the Secretary of State Lansing today with a request for action. The complaint lodged with the secretary by Swedish Minister Ekengren, who stated that British mail pouches destined for Sweden have been broken open in England, that letters had been opened and censored, and that one registered had been retained.
