New Base Ball League Formed.

At a meeting held in the Y. M. C. A. parlors yesterday afternoon a base ball league to be known as the St. John Public Schools Base Ball League was formed. The league will consist of teams from the Centennial, Aberdeen, Leinster, St. Peter's, St. Malachi's, Alexandria, Winter Street, and the Synagogue schools. W. H. Moor, secretary of the boys' department of the Y. M. C. A., presided at the meeting. It was decided that the first game of the league should be played on July 5, and that games should be played on Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday and Friday of each week. It is altogether likely that two games will be played on each of the above days. The games will all be played on the Weldon lot. The Y. M. C. A. has donated an oak shield for the winner of the league.

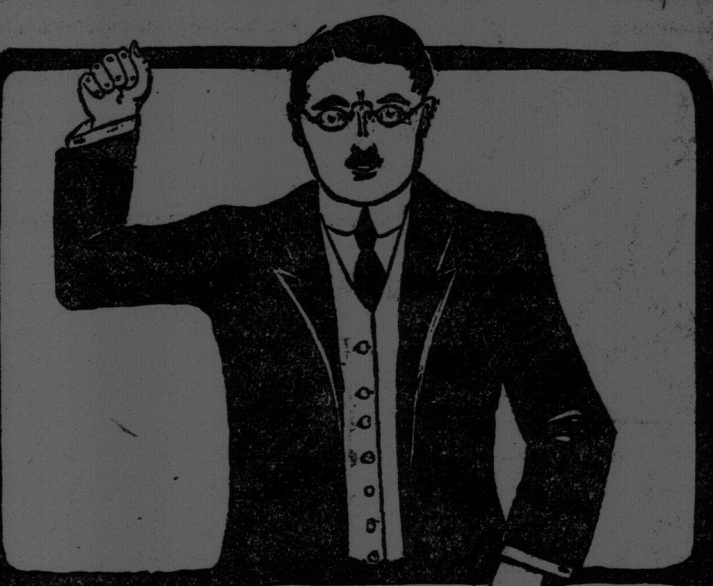
