The witness, Charles William Gregory, once a New Jersey machinist, was sought today by Chapman's lawyers to supplement with oral testimony an affidavit he already has made, saying he talked to Chapman on a train coming to New York the night before the murder of Policeman James Skelley, in New Britain, Conn. Chapman is sentenced to hang April 6, for killing the policeman.
