SAILORS OF RUM SHIP ACQUITTED

Seven Found Not Guilty of Theft Will Be Deported to England

Not long following the dismissal of the case against the men, Percy Rainsford, George Levitt, Archibald Horner, John Briggs, George Gregory, Thomas Hesith and Samuel Roberts, a writ was issued out of the Admiralty Court and the Clare Matheau arrested for wages owing the crew, amounting to about \$500. The seven members of the crew who were charged with theft were taken in charge by the Canadian immigration authorities and they will be deported to their homes in England.

30 Passengers Off Liner From New York Escape Injury

The express left the rails in a terrific thunder storm which caused a washout. The engine turned over and five coaches piled up in a twisted mass. All those killed were French. No Canadians were among the casualties. The first class compartments at the rear of the train carried 30 passengers from the liner Suffren from New York who had failed to catch the regular boat train for Paris, but fortunately all escaped.


On Bigamy Charge
