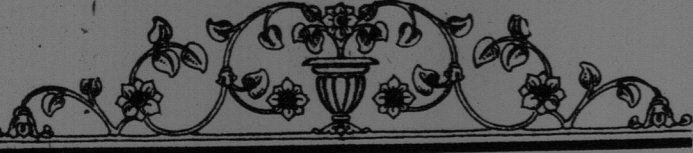

### BISHOP PLANS FOR SCHOOL BOND ISSUE

Outlines Project in Cathedral to Finance Erection of Buildings.

In the Cathedral at the 9.15 mass on Sunday His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc announced that he was considering an issue of bonds to finance the large expenditure of recent years for school buildings in the city and the proposed new structure to replace the old St. Malachi's school at the corner of Sydney and Leinster streets. He said that the plan was to include the Cliff street building, the new one in Holy Trinity parish, the new one in St. Peter's parish, all of which have been completed and are in use, and the cost of the large building of the Wiggins Male Orphan Institution in St. James street, purchased and now used as a school for St. John the Baptist parish. The three that had been built, he said, cost about \$600,000, and the purchase of the St. Malachi's would mean perhaps another \$200,000, a total expenditure roughly of \$800,000. This was, he said, a large yearly interest charge at the banks, and there was no unwillingness on the part of the banks to continue to carry the loans, but the issue of bonds, as proposed, would mean a considerable yearly saving and would be easier on the people, distributing the burden over a term of years. The plan, he said, had the approval of the diocesan consultors, but he wished to place it before the people, and asked that if there were any objections on their part they be made known to him in the course of the present week or so. It was the intention to make the bond issue about the first of the new year.

### THEY APPRECIATE MESSAGES SENT

Premier King and Dr. Pugsley Reply to Veniot Banquet Wires.

At the Veniot banquet held on Thursday evening it was formally resolved to have telegrams sent to the Rt. Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, Prime Minister of Canada, welcoming him on his return to the Dominion from the Imperial Conference, also a telegram expressive of the good wishes of the company to the Hon. William Pugsley and extending the hope for his early recovery. Alexander McMillan, chairman at the banquet board, has received telegrams of acknowledgement from both Hon. Mackenzie King and from Mrs. William Pugsley on behalf of her husband. The messages were as follows: "Alexander McMillan, St. John: 'I much appreciate your kind telegram, just received, conveying, on behalf of the meeting held at St. John last night in honor of Premier Veniot, a message of welcome on my return to Canada from the Imperial Conference. Will you please express to Hon. W. L. Mackenzie King, the mover of the resolution, and to those present at the gathering my hearty thanks for their most generous expression of approval.'"

"W. L. MACKENZIE KING," Ottawa, Nov. 30. "Lt.-Col. Alexander McMillan, St. John: 'Mr. Pugsley wishes me to express his warm appreciation of the kindly spirit shown by the resolution passed at the banquet at the Veniot Banquet last evening and his sincere thanks for their good wishes for his early recovery to health.'"

### LOCAL NEWS

DR. ROBERTS AWAY. Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Provincial Minister of Public Health, left this morning for Moncton to attend a meeting of the Provincial Government. Another meeting will be held here tomorrow.

CHAUDIERE IS IN. The Royal Mail Steam Packet liner Chaudiere arrived in port this morning from Bermuda and the British West Indies with 71 passengers, mail, 2,000 tons of sugar for the Atlantic Refinery, 600 puncheons of molasses and general cargo. She docked at the Refinery wharf.

RECEIVED NEARLY \$1,100. The annual collection for the funds of St. Vincent de Paul Society, which looks after cases of destitution in the Cathedral parish, was taken before all the masses in the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception yesterday and a generous response was made. Although the amount of the collection has not yet been announced, it is said to have totalled nearly \$1,100.

FIRST MASS NEXT SUNDAY. The first mass in the newly created parish of East St. John will be celebrated on next Sunday, according to announcement made yesterday in the Index by His Lordship Bishop LeBlanc. A hall has been secured for the service, the Bishop said, and this will be used until the cement of the new church is completed.

TRIP PROVES POPULAR. Fifty-nine passengers took advantage of the late car which the N. B. Power Co. operated from head of King street at 12.30 o'clock on Sunday morning. The trip was a successful one, according to the number using it on the first trip a week ago, and officials of the company are now practically certain that the experiment was justified.

### 33 CANDIDATES ARE CONFIRMED

Bishop Richardson, in Mission Church, Speaks of Church of England.

A large congregation attended the Sunday evening service of the Mission Church, when His Lordship Bishop Richardson confirmed 33 candidates—19 men and boys, and 14 girls. Prior to confirmation His Lordship gave a very interesting address, taking as his text, What the Church of England Stood For. The bishop said that the Church of England was not a new church, but one of the first. He said it was like an old ocean liner that sailed the choppy seas and gathered much seaweed and barnacles and was placed in dry dock and scraped and cleaned of the seaweed and barnacles that clung to it to stop its progress, and was then placed on the way again not as a new steamer but as the same old one without anything clinging to it to stop progress. He said it was today recognized as the first church and not an offspring of any other organization. The bishop congratulated the Rev. J. V. Young, priest in charge, on his eighth anniversary, and of the great work he had done in the Mission church in his eight years and hoped he would continue in his good work.

### ATTACKING PARTY WAS VICTORIOUS

Local Cadets Carried Out Tactical Scheme in West St. John.

Some 250 cadets of the local corps engaged in a tactical scheme in West St. John on Saturday under the direction of Capt. DeV. Fain, who said today that the manoeuvres were a great success.
