



He said that American consuls in Europe also had been instructed to cause a close inspection to be made of every ship sailing with immigrants, and to refuse bills of health to ships that did not meet the standards of cleani-

ness.

Although these measures fall short of Dr. Copeland's plea to the President to stop all immigration from disease-infected areas, it is the opinion of public health officials that they will be adequate to prevent any disease from becoming a scourge in this country. Health Commiss oner Copeland said that he was greatly disappointed that the President had not placed the embargo on immigration, but that he believed the same result would be accomplished, at least in some measure, by the examination at foreign ports under the supervision of American consuls.
