**GOLF.**  
To "Ration" Games.  
London, Feb. 18.—Golf links in many parts of the country are becoming so congested that clubs are taking steps to adopt a scheme of regulating the number of games played.  
The most drastic step of all has been taken by the Montrose Club, in Scotland, which has 1,500 members. Each member is being supplied with a card bearing his name and a serial number and containing 100 spaces. He will have to produce this card whenever he wants to play and have one of the spaces stamped by the official starter before his game.  
When the whole 100 spaces have been stamped he will have exhausted his year's ration of golf—at any rate for those links.

**ALL AGENCIES JOIN IN FIGHT ON TYPHUS**  
New York Invokes Old Law Barring Vessels From Piers Without City Sanction.  
(New York Times)  
A medical alliance to prevent immigrants infected with typhus or any other serious disease from landing in this country was completed yesterday by the United States Public Health Service, the City Health Department and the State medical officers at the Quarantine station.  
These agencies, through all their facilities for inspection, will co-operate to prevent any immigrant from landing in this country until he is, with his baggage, has been put through a defauntying plant and submitted to a series of stringent medical inspections. The health officers of all these agencies agreed yesterday to the fullest extent of the law would be meted out to those evading any of the provisions.  
Resurrecting from the Sanitary Codes of the State a law passed in 1902, when typhus and other serious diseases threatened the city, Dr. Royal S. Copeland, Health Commissioner, announced yesterday that no ship from a foreign port would be permitted to come within 300 feet of a pier in this city until the proper permit had been issued by the 2nd Department of the city after stringent inspection. This will add the inspection of city health officials to that made by State and Federal authorities at the Quarantine station in New York Bay. The provisions of the law have not been enforced in late years.  
Dr. Copeland's measures for protecting the city against any possible cases of typhus among immigrants were approved in detail yesterday by Dr. Hugh S. Cumming, Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service, with whom the city Health Commissioner consulted for a half an hour on the telephone. Dr. Cumming told of the work that had been done in Washington to prevent the landing of immigrants infected with typhus and informed Dr. Copeland that a reassignment of Public Health officials was being made in foreign countries to prevent suspected immigrants and unclear ships from leaving foreign ports.  
**Hoboken Joins in Fight.**  
The police boat John P. Hyman yesterday a patrol of the three vessels held at Quarantine because typhus cases had been found among passengers, and today will assume the duty of making sure that no foreign ship proceeds to a pier anywhere in this city without the official permission of the City Health Department.
